TOPEKA, Kan., June 3.—(Special Telegram.)—The Braves administered the third successive defeat to Marty Krug's hopefuls today by a score of 4 to 1 up to today. Larson's record was credited with no defeats for the current season. He was yanked in the first game here, but a subsequent pitcher received the credit for that defeat. Today Larson went the full route.

It was a nip and tuck game, Kafora's mighty home run swat in the first inning, after Brown had walked, put Omaha two runs to the good. The locals got one back in their half and with a little better base running might have evened the count right there. But Forsythe's accurate peg killed the tying run at the plate.
