

SENATORS SLOW TO MIX MEDICINE

Presidency and Secretaryship Appear Not Yet Arranged in Upper Body.

KOHL AND GRACE LACK COMPANY Appear to Be Only Ones So Far Mentioned for This Place on the Roster of Officers.

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 2.—(Special.)—Organization of the senate next Monday night by the democratic majority, does not seem to be anything more than very much, the fight over the speakership and chief clerkship of the house occupying the minds of the members of the senate apparently more than their own little battle over the secretaryship of the senate.

Three men want to be secretary of the senate. At least two want to be and the third is in a very positive frame of mind, although he says he is not working very hard. "Doc" Tanner of South Omaha and Editor Walrath of Osceola are avowed candidates and have been since election. About a week ago friends of Senator J. A. Olla of Ord precipitated his name into the fight and at the present time he appears to be in the spotlight. It is noticeable that nearly all of the old members are for Olla and as there is quite a handful of them, they are cutting a big figure in the battle.

Presidency Fight Leads. There is absolutely no talk up to noon today over the presidency of the senate, Senator Kohl of Wayne and Senator Grace of Harlan appear to be the only ones mentioned, and nobody appears to know whether they are really candidates of their own free will and accord. Neither gentlemen has appeared on the scene at noon and consequently most of the talk is guess work.

It is generally remarked that this has been the busiest Saturday before the opening of a legislature in the memory of the oldest inhabitant. Members have been very slow in coming in.

Byrnes' Hand Seen. Chairman W. H. Thompson of the democratic state committee by "butting" into the fight has aroused criticism of the members. Open revolt is not shown right now, but side remarks indicate that there will be something doing if the "Little Giant" gets too insistent. There is little doubt but the Bryans are trying to organize the legislature. In fact, one member was told by one of Secretary Bryn's trusted lieutenants that if he wanted to get in on the winning side he must go and see Charlie Bryan and get in right.

Lobby Slow to Arrive. Absence of "friends of the corporations" is also noticeable at this time. Perhaps they, too, have caught the dilatory tactics of the members and are not hurrying to the scene of legislative conflict. Perhaps the fact that "mysterious individuals" holding conferences in dark places about the lobbies, have not been discovered also has a tendency to keep down the excitement, but, be that as it may, there are yet three days to the opening and the waiting is good.

Among old members of the senate who are here are Krumbaugh of Polk, Beal of Custer, who served several years ago; Wink of Buffalo, Shumway of Burt, Malley of Box-Butte, who served in the lower body, but has been here several days. Dr. Wilcox of Red Willow, who defeated Senator Cordell, is also on the ground. Lieutenant Governor Pearson dropped in this morning.

Bobsled Hits Street Car, Boy Dead, Two Others Are Dying

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 2.—One boy was killed, two probably fatally injured and three others seriously injured when a bobsled on which they were coasting last night crashed into a street car. The sled, which was traveling at a terrific speed down a steep incline, got beyond control and at the foot of the hill hit the car, as the latter came to a stop on a curve. The motorman saw the sled coming and stopped his car, hoping thereby to avoid confusing the coasters. Before he had an opportunity to back his car from the corner, the sled hit the front truck and the boys were thrown against the car and to the pavement. The skull of the dead boy, Russell E. Latta, 7 years old, was crushed; his brother, Fulmer, 8 years, suffered a fractured skull; Harry White, 16, struck the street car with his head and suffered concussion of the brain and other serious injuries of the head and body. The other injured are Kenneth Ryan, 12 years, spine injured; Lyman Nebeker, 15 years, leg broken, body badly bruised; Phillip Halperzen, 17 years, leg broken.

Sultan and Porte Prepare to Flee Into Asia Minor

LONDON, Jan. 2.—The correspondent of the EXPRESS in Athens reports that a state of panic exists in Constantinople and that the Turks have abandoned all idea of taking the offensive.

"The Holy Relics," the dispatch continues, "have been removed to Bursa, Asia Minor, where the sultan and porte are preparing to follow. All available forces, about 150,000 men, are concentrated in the city.

"Adriatic has been practically evacuated and the heavy guns removed to Tebatalja, which is near the Turkish capital. Frenzied trenching is in progress along the shores of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus, and preparations are being made to resist the passage of a hostile fleet.

"The attack on Egypt has been definitely abandoned and the troops have been recalled to defend the Asiatic side of the straits and Bursa.

"Everything points to Constantinople being the first enemy's capital to fall."
