By a decree of United States District Judge Pace Morris, just filed here, Walter L. Cropper, his wife, Beulah M. Cropper, and the Mutual Rating and Adjustment association of Omaha are perpetually enjoined from using or distributing certain forms claimed exclusively by Will M. Davis of Chicago, by virtue of a five-year contract. The Croppers are said to have worked for Davis in Chicago, and then to have started a similar business of their own in Omaha, with offices in The Bee building. Davis said to stop them from using advertising methods similar to his. Books mentioned in the decree, which the defendants are enjoined from using, are the "Red Guide and Credit Record" and "Collecting by Rating." Defendants' exceptions to the decree were allowed by the judge.
