This section, after prescribing the duty of the election commissioner to supply and equip all election booths and polling places and conduct the elections, conciudes:

Provided, however, the expense of hold-ing and conducting separately, any city, municipality or school district election shall be charged to and paid by the city, municipality or school district holding the

election.
