WEEK'S CLEARANCES GREATER

OMAHA, Jan. 9, 1915. For several days a new high level has been made in the wheat pit Yestorday the May future crossed the \$1.41% level. CHICAGO, Jan. 9.—Rumors that the United States might put an embargo on breadstuffs and that the Dardanelies were likely to be forced proved grim begies today for owners of wheat. As a consequence the market, after violent changes, closed half demoralized at 3½c to 2½c under last night. Other leading staples, too, showed a setback—corn ½c to ½c net, oats and provisions &c to 7½610c.

Wheat made a bewildering drop of more than 2c a bushel in the first few minutes of trading, influenced chiefly by nervoushess in regard to talk of an attempt to set congress to prohibit the outbound shipment of wheat and flour and the like from the United States, on the ground that a scarcity of domestic supplies was threatened. Panicky offerings of wheat, however, quickly passed into strong hands, and when sellers partly recovered from their fright and tried to buy back they found that the surplus in the pit had virtually disappeared.
