Visitors in Omaha See Good Business Outlook Ahead, but No Extensions Are Promised.

CAPITAL TO QUIT ITS HIDING

Omaha is filled with visiting railroad men coming in from other sections of the country and all are optimists, seeing good business in sight for next year, although they are not predicting anything in the way of extensions of lines in this or other territory.

Vice President Blabon of the Chicago Great Western, accompanied by his assistant, C. R. Berry, arrived after a trio over the company lines, and, relative to he conditions and the outlook, the former said:

'The Chicago Great Western has no cause for complaint. Our business is good and we are looking for a continuation of the improvement, at least until the movement of grain ends. Westbound business is equally good, Omaha taking large quantities of grain and heavy shipents of live stock from Iowa and Minne-

"On this trip I have been over practically all our lines, and in all sections I find business better than during last with indications that there will be a marked improvement in the future. In the country towns merchants have let their stocks run low, but now with the high prices maintaining for all kinds of farm products, merchants are buying freely, anticipating a good spring and

summer trade. Much Wheat Unsold.

estimate that through our territory and in Nebraska and Kansas, in the aggregate, there is still about 25 per cent of the wheat crop of last year unsold and in the hands of farmers, being held for still higher prices. Up to this time the corn is practically all in the hands of the farmers, though the present high prices ought to start this cereal to moving within a very short time."

k "Up in our section of the country." said Superintendent Young of the Burlington, with headquarters at Alliance, Neb., "we do not bank on vast quantilties of grain, but last year the farmers raised crops that were of the bumper variety. Considerable of the wheat has been sold, but there is still a large quantity in first hands, but the present high prices are going to start it to market

"The present winter has been one of the most favorable ones that the stockmen of western Nebraska and Wyoming have ever experienced. The animals are coming through the winter with little feed except that picked up on the range and on account of there having been no storms, the losses have been at the lowest minimum.
