"The United States may be trusted to vindicate its commercial rights and embrace its commercial opportunities during the war. In so doing it will tend to advance its financial strength to a point where it may serve the world. Keencapitalized. The question is one that eyed statesmen in both camps realize must be settled, and the settlement, how seriously the financial adjustment may be prejudiced, if desperate militar ism shall be suffered to impair the financial stability of the United States.
