

PROGRAM EVENTS FOR MOTOR SHOW

Each Night Bears Distinctive Designation and Special Programs Have Been Arranged.

THURSDAY TO BE SOCIETY NIGHT

Omaha's tenth annual automobile show, to be held at the Auditorium February 15 to 20, will offer much to entertain visitors in addition to the study of the motor car offerings of the season.

A cabaret show may be the big feature for at least one night of the week. Manager Powell is negotiating for talent, and if it can be arranged, he will put on a cabaret show every night, with half a dozen professional singers and musicians to mingle with the crowds and render the latest musical hits.

Monday night will be the formal opening of the show. The details of the program have not been completed, but something interesting is promised, and the speeches, if any are made at all, will be short and to the point.

Tuesday night will be given over entirely to music. Olson's orchestra has been engaged for the entire week, and on Tuesday night will render a special concert program that will be well worth hearing.

Wednesday night is dedicated to the automobile dealers from the surrounding territory. It is expected that practically all dealers who plan to attend the show will be in the city by that time, and the local dealers and members of the show association are planning to give them an entertainment that will linger in their memories after they return home.

Thursday night will be society night. This has always been a big feature of the show and with the addition of the cabaret features planned for the evening, an evening of real entertainment. Dressing clothes will be proper for this occasion if you care to dress.

Friday night is still open but it is likely that the big special cabaret show of the week will be given that night, when the songs and dancing will be almost a complete vaudeville entertainment.

Saturday night the show will close and no program has been arranged for them except that the orchestra will play and the cars will still be there for inspection.

From the very beginning of the automobile industry, engineers have sought a means of obtaining maximum strength in the parts subjected to heavy strain, without adding useless weight to the completed car.

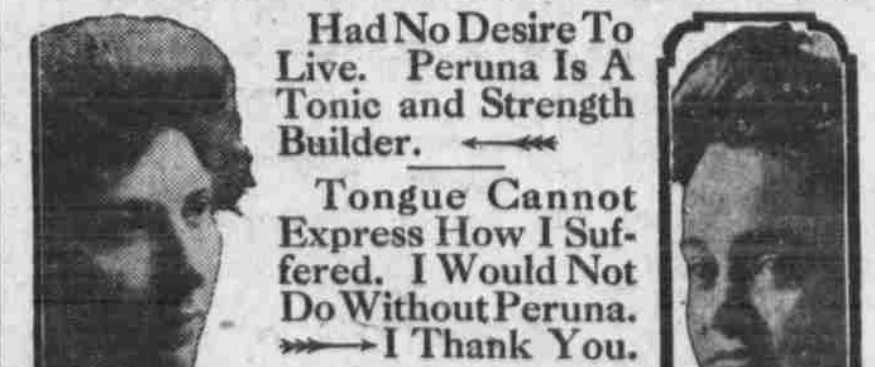
Decide to Arbitrate Mine Wage Dispute
