Rine is Confident Jury Commissioner Bill Become a Law

"I feel confident the jury commissioner bill will be passed by the legislature," remarked City Attorney John A. Rine upon his return from Lincoln, where he spent three days examining legislation affecting municipal affairs here.

Mr. Rine was particularly interested in a bill which would change the present one-fifth assessed valuation scheme to 100 per cent valuation for assessment purposes, the levy in mills being proportionately reduced. He is confident this bill will be passed.

The city attorney explains that in the eastern states there are laws prohibiting savings banks investing money in bonds of cities which are bonded more than 7 per cent of the valuation, and not long ago the New York courts held that the actual valuation here is that upon which the tax rate is based, while as a matter of fact it is only one-fifth of the actual valuation.

This bill merely makes it possible for Omaha to put up a better valuation front and thus improve the demand for municipal bonds.
