AMERICAN SUGAR IS WEAK

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—Renewal of liquidation in several of the high-priced divivend paying railway shares and continuance of the recent pool manipulation in certain of the specialties, notably the automobile issues, were productive of some mixed price movements in today's stock market. Canadian Pacific and Southern Pacific, as well as Reading and part of the granger group, were underpressure, which seemed to result more from liquidation than short setting. Rumor attributed the selling of Canadian Pacific and some other favorities to the foreign account, but international brokers reported little liquidation for Burope. United States Steel and the coppers were sympathetically affected, the one notable exception being Bethlehem Steel, which was the most active feature of the morning session, with a rise of almost three points, which it maintained despite another authoritative denial of the rumor that the stock is soon to be placed on a dividend basis.
