

FULL VALUATION YET ALIVE

Committee that Threw it Out as Unconstitutional May Be Forced to Reconsider It.

ELSE MUST WAIT TWO YEARS

A large amount of interest centers about the progress of the bill in the legislature providing for the full valuation of real estate for taxation purposes.

Saturday morning came the announcement that Senator Saunders was making an effort to save it by getting it re-submitted to the committee.

The system of full valuation of real estate instead of the one-fifth valuation is in vogue in a great many states, and has long been sought and agitated in this state by some.

The bill carried the endorsement of the Omaha Commercial club, the Real Estate exchange, the city commission and various other organizations that believed this system of valuation for taxation purposes would be best.

Much to the surprise of both of them, however, and to a lot of others who favored it, it was declared unconstitutional by the attorney general before it even went to the committee, to say nothing of getting before the senate or the supreme court.

High Schools to Settle Government Ownership Problem

The State High School Debating League, made up of Omaha, South Omaha, Stella, Nebraska City, Schuyler, North Bend, Bellevue Academy and Weeping Water will start debating in the near future.

Debates will be concluded by March 1. Schools first paired in the following manner: Stella vs. Nebraska City; Schuyler vs. North Bend; Bellevue vs. Weeping Water; and Omaha vs. South Omaha.

The Omaha-South Omaha debate will take place at the Central high school auditorium February 28. The question will be that of government ownership, it being debated by the league. Omaha will have the negative. The winner of this debate will debate the winner of the Schuyler-North Bend contest, and the winner of the Stella-Nebraska City will debate the winner of the Bellevue-Weeping Water. The winners of these contests will debate against each other to determine the district championship.

The best member of the winning team will go to Lincoln to represent his district.

Storm of the Week Has Moved On East

The blizzard general over northern Nebraska, South Dakota, eastern Wyoming, Iowa and southern Minnesota during the greater portion of the week has become a matter of history so far as this portion of the central west is concerned. In the evening there will be more demonstrations and exhibitions by the older girls of the association. The domestic arts, millinery and china painting classes will have exhibitions of the work done during the last term. There will be music and other entertainment during the entire evening.

Classes planning to take work in any class the second term should register for them this week. A new class is being organized for this term in first aid to the injured, which will be taught by physiotherapists of the city.

In millinery there will be both day and evening classes. The day class will be a long course of fifteen lessons, Tuesday and Friday, from 3 to 4:30. The short course is to be given in the evening from 6:30 to 8 o'clock on Tuesday.

A number of the entertainment course is to be given February 12, when the Dundee Woman's club will present a masque, "A Thousand Years Ago." This will be to the members of the association and admission will be by ticket only, which will be given on presentation of a membership ticket.

The Valentine-party will be given Monday night, February 15. This is given for all young women of the city, whether they are members of the association or not.

Allen Bros. Building to Again Be Put to Use

After standing vacant for a year, the building at Tenth and Farnam streets, formerly occupied by the Allen Brothers' Wholesale Grocery company, is almost immediately to have three tenants, an implement company, plumbing supply manufacturing company, and an asbestos supplies wholesale house.

The property has been leased to the Oliver-Chilled Plow works through the agency of George & Co., but does not take the entire building, however, but a portion of it, 65x132 feet.

The Oliver-Chilled Plow works has its home office at South Bond, Ind., and has for some time maintained a branch in small rooms at Ninth and Douglas streets. It will now go into the wholesale implement business in Omaha on a large scale.

The plow company has negotiated two subleases on portions of the building. A part of the space is to be taken by the A. Y. McDonald Manufacturing company of Dubuque, Ia., wholesale plumbing supplies, and a part by the Johns-Manville company, wholesale asbestos dealers.

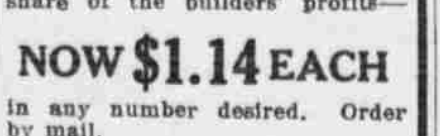

Of the various hotels being built in Omaha, the Keen, Eighteenth and Harney streets, was the first to open its doors. This place, remodeled and made into a hotel by Harry Wolf, who expended \$20,000 on it, contains seventy-two rooms. It is a semi-fireproof building. It will cater largely to family trade, although it expects to handle a wholesale transient trade also. The remodeling of this building, making the two upper floors into hotel rooms and the lower floor into store and office rooms, has greatly improved the corner of Eighteenth and Harney streets.

WINTER BYLES BUYS BIG FARM NORTH OF VALLEY

The 21-acre farm of the Ageo Land and Live Stock company, thirty miles west of Omaha, has just been sold to Winter Byles and the consideration is \$25,000. This is about \$125 an acre. The farm lies a mile and a half northeast of Valley. The farm has been in the Ageo family for forty years. H. A. Ageo, a ranchman of Nevada, is president of the company that held the farm up to now.

Santa Fe Puts On a New Fast Mail Train

Omaha mails for the west will be affected by a change made in the routing of some of the Chicago-Los Angeles mail as the result of a new fast train put on by the Santa Fe railroad. Herbert the Rock Island and Union Pacific roads have had nearly a monopoly on mail from Chicago to Los Angeles. The Santa Fe has now put on a new train which leaves Chicago at 10:20 a. m. and arrives in Los Angeles at noon of the third day, making several hours' better time than the other roads.

The change, however, will compel the Santa Fe to carry less of the Colorado mail than it did before and this will now come through Omaha.

C. M. Reed, superintendent of the Fourteenth division of the railway mail service, with headquarters at Omaha, points out that more mail comes across the continent by way of Omaha than by way of any of the four other transcontinental routes. Practically all mail coming from foreign countries, via San Francisco, is routed to the east through Omaha.
