DEAN WEST ON EDUCATION

Princeton Man Tells of the Requirements if One Would Be Well Educated.

FAITH IS AN IMPORTANT NEED

"The neglect of the classics is one of the crimes of our modern education. Greek is a study as much greater than Latin as Latin is greater than Choctaw, in spite of Mr. Carnegie's remark that he didn't see any difference between Greek and Choctaw. I don't see how he could."

This week part of a plea for more liberal education and less of the merely commercial, made by Dean Andrew Fleming West of the Graduate school of Princeton university, made following a luncheon in his honor at the University club Monday noon.

Introduced by Herbert Rogers, Dr. West remarked that he thought it better to receive "tatty" during life than to have it in the form of "epitaphy" after death. "If we fail to leave the way open for every boy to rise as high as he wants to we are behind certain monarchical governments which have opened the way and we fall far short of the spirit of democracy," he declared.

"If we confine our efforts to the mere commercial, practical education, we do not go beyond the education of Babylon and Nineveh and Tyre.

Must Know the World.

"There are certain things that a man must know to have a liberal education. He must know the universe, the world of nature. For this he needs physical and natural sciences, chemistry, biology. He must know mathematics, the foundation of all these.

"Then he must know the inner world, the world of mankind and his individual self. He finds this in history, that panorama of the activities of mankind, modern and ancient.

"But at the foundation of all these is still deeper knowledge, like the stem that nourishes the flower. That is philosophy. And below this, like the root of the flower, is something still more fundamental, more important, faith. It rules in the realm where knowledge is not possible, where we must believe without knowing. And that is the foundation of all liberal education, of all that makes a man satisfied when he comes to the end of life, that he has lived his life to the best advantage."
