### WILL SUSTAIN WILL OF LATE S. D. BANGS

Judge Crawford So Announces from Bench, but Allows Contestants More Time for Argument.

#### SAYS HE IS REQUIRED BY LAW

Announcement that the will of the late Stephen D. Bangs, Omaha pioneer and capitalist, which divided a quarter of a million dollars among Omaha charitable institutions and members of the family of the late Richard S. Hall, his stepson, would be sustained, was made from the bench by County Judge Crawford after all the evidence in the contest case had been presented.

A request by attorneys for Gilbert M. Bangs of New York and George H. Bangs of Wayne, the contestants, who claim to be second cousins of the deceased, that decision by the court be postponed in order to allow further argument of a law point involved was granted. Judge Crawford, however, indicated his belief that a supreme court decision required him to uphold the will.

The point involved grew out of testimony by Dr. Alfred S. Mattson and Miss Nettie Butler, a nurse, witnesses of the will, that they were not specifically notified of the nature of the document to which they signed their names.

The following bequests to charitable institutions are involved in the suit: Trinity cathedral, \$50,000; Clarkson hospital, \$5,000; Gardner Memorial parish, \$5,000; Associated Charities, \$2,500.

Mrs. Henry Homan, a nurse, who attended Mr. Bangs up to within a few weeks of his death, was the only witness presented by the contestants. She testified that Mr. Bangs discussed with her the disposition he intended to make of his property and that his intention was different from that expressed in the will made one day previous to his death.
