NEW YORK, Feb. 2.—Stocks were inclined to make further upward progress in the early stages of today's session, but suden weakness in New York Central which declined 44 points, soon caused a general unsettlement, the list closing with a heavy tone and numerous net losses. Central's precipitate decline was associated with the propaged issue of \$100,000,000 bonds at 5 per cent interest.

Another development which should have recounded to the advantage of the local market, was a further break in exchange on London to the lowest quotation since October of 1907. The decline resulted from extensive offerings of bala against supplies bought in this country by some of the foreign governments now at war. Inscidentally, Germany's gold slatus once more came into consideration with a new low record for marks, while London reported the removal of about \$1,500,000 foreign gold coin from the Bank of England.
