League of Municipalities Proposes that Provision Be Made in Case of Municipal Ownership.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 11 .- (Special.)-The League of Nebraska Municipalities today recommended changes in several bills before the legislature, chief among which is H. R. No. 207, Rallway Commissioner Hall's bill, requiring a certificate of necessity and public convenience from the State Rallway commision, before a recommended that after the word, "corporation," in this bill, the words "not municipally or publically" owned , be in serted and that the following be added: 'Nothing in this act shall affect or apply to municipally or publically owned cor-

As to Paving Matters.

In S. F. No. 21, relating to a threefifths petition of front foot property in paving districts, amendmen was asked to permit the council to estab lish arbitrarily a paving district, where and that after due notice had been given property owners, to proceed with such improvement unless petition by a majority of the property owners. It is also recommended that in paving the Missouri law be followed, which permits a majority of the property owners in a district to force paving, regardless of whether they own a majority of the foot frontage; meaning pure numerical majority rule.

Firemen's Injuries. It is recommended that senate files Nos. 24 and 25 be amended so as to require an injured fireman to file claim for damages within sixty days after such injury, and from the fire chief.




