Basis of Commission Opinion. To secure any considerable percentage of this coast-to-coast traffic rates on many commodities must be established by the rail lines materially lower than those now existing. If the railroads are able to make such rates from the Atlantic seaboard to the Pacific coast as will hold to their lines some portion of this traffic with profit to themselves, they should be permitted to do so. The acceptance of this traffic will add something, to the net revenues and to an extent decrease and not increase the burden that must be borne by other traffic. It will also give the shippers at the coast points the benefits of an additional and a competitive

(From a Staff Correspondent.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.-(Special Telegram.)-The sundry civil bill now being considered in the house contains appropriations for carrying out the building of some of the postoffices in Nebraska that have previously been authorized.
