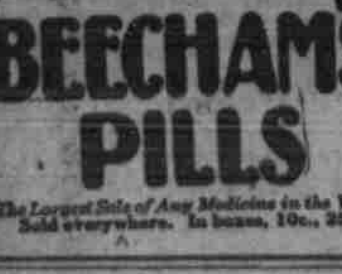

Dealers All Along Highway Preparing for Entertainment of Thousands of Visitors.

MANY NEW FIRMS TO EXHIBIT

Auto row is one of the busiest places in Omaha just now. Everybody from proprietors to janitors of the auto shops is working night and day to get things ready for the visit of the 2,000 dealers and 8,000 prospective purchasers of autos, whom Manager Clarke Powell expects to come here next week from all over Nebraska and adjoining states for the big Auto show.

"It's going to be a big thing for Omaha, as well as for all auto dealers, owners and prospective buyers," Powell says. "Besides bringing in thousands of high class visitors, who will see our city and go away boosters, the show means business of all sorts for Omaha business men,

Fresh Stock of Supplies. Every dealer on the row is getting in a fresh stock of cars and supplies, and many models and articles will be shown in store rooms, as there is not room enough for all in the Auditorium exhibit space.
