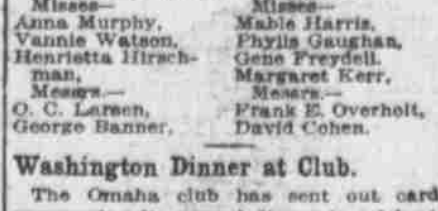

It was shown that Bugiewicz during a fire left his company for an hour and worked under directions of another captain. It was charged that political motives caused his removal.

Fireman's Widow is to Draw Monthly Pension. Mrs. Susie Henderson, widow of Joseph H. Henderson, a city fireman, who died of pneumonia in 1904, has been placed on the pension roll of the firemen's relief fund at \$22.75 a month and the city has dismissed its appeal in her mandamus suit, according to a stipulation filed in district court.
