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## POLICE FIRED WITH HOPE FOR SUCCESS

Italian Admits He Fed Gonzales in Norfolk as Late as Wednesday Night.

## SAYS MEXICAN IS IN BAD SHAPE

New hope for the capture of Ignacia Gonzales, third of the Mexicans connected with the murder of Detective Tom Ring, has fired the Omaha and Norfolk police to renewed efforts and it is expected that the bandit will soon be discovered.

A new clue has given the police proof that Gonzales was in Norfolk Wednesday night about 7:45, for at that hour he appeared at the home of Joe Davis a Greek section hand, begged not to be betrayed and asked for food. Davis, who was partially dressed and barefooted, set food before the Mexican and on the pretext of drawing a bucket of water, left the house, ran to a neighbor's and phoned the police. When the officers arrived the man had gone.

Davis said Gonzales was weak from hunger and in a very bedraggled condition. About his shoulders he had wrapped a horseblanket and the fact that this and his apparel was covered with straw leads the police to believe he has been hiding in some barn since his escape from the section house.

## Was There Before.

Davis says he fed Gonzales on Monday and Tuesday, stating that the Mexican appeared at his shack Tuesday evening, probably right after his escape from the section house.

While Davis was preparing food for the man, the latter asked what had become of Cantano. Upon being told that he had been captured and had confessed, Gonzales cursed him bitterly. Davis is helping the authorities in their search and his help is greatly valued, as he not only could recognize the Mexican at a distance, but speaks Mexican fluently and could interpret any remarks of the Mexican in event of his capture.

The police believe Gonzales is so far gone that he may give himself up before the passing of many more days. If not the search for him will be continued and they believe he is bound to be caught in the net.

Six squads of Norfolk and Omaha police, together with three possees, are searching all of Norfolk and south Norfolk, going through houses, sheds, hay stacks, barns, box cars and the like. At Pender a squad is working under Art Cunningham, at Emerson Eddie Fleming and Sergeant Ferris are located and Frank Williams is leading a squad to Dakota City, from where he will work back to Wayne.

## Zanches Sticks to Story.

Thomas Zanches will be arraigned on a less serious charge than the other Mexicans unless developments positively indicate he was with the other two when the killing of Ring took place.

Zanches still insists he was in Kansas City when the shooting occurred, and had not seen Gonzales and Cantano since they had their pictures taken together in that city.

Although much of the stolen property

found in the trunks brought from Kansas City with Zanches has been identified by local railroad detectives, J. D. Blocher of Chicago, representing the Illinois Central, arrived in Omaha Thursday morning to look over the goods, as he believes some of the articles were taken from cars on his road.

## RAIN IS GENERAL OVER EASTERN HALF OF STATE

Reports to the railroads indicate that rain was general over the east half and practically all of Iowa Wednesday night, in many localities continuing till morning. In some places it was a regular summer downpour, but generally it was a light drizzle.

The same reports are to the effect that the snow has about disappeared and that the warm weather having thawed the ground, most of the water is soaking into the ground instead of running into the streams and ravines.

## Administrators Are Named for Estate of Late John Linder

Otto Vorsatz and Hugh Hartson, employees of the wholesale liquor house of which the late John Linder, who was killed by a fall in an elevator shaft, was proprietor, were appointed special administrators of his estate in Omaha under \$30,000 bond by County Judge Crawford. They will conduct the business pending settlement of the estate.

The petition filed by John Metzger, grandson, sets forth the Oscar Linder, a son, Mrs. Nettie Linder Green, a grandson and Metzger are the heirs to Mr. Linder's \$400,000 estate. The property of the estate is about equally divided in Nebraska and Iowa. It was said.

Probate proceedings will be begun in both Omaha and Council Bluffs. A contest on the part of alleged heirs not

named in Mr. Metzger's petition may develop, according to unofficial information received by the county court.
