House Has Under Consideration for Time Measure of Lanigan Providing for the Change.

MOCKETT DECIDEDLY OPPOSED

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 20 .- (Special.) - A bill introduced by Representative Lanigan of Greeley, known as house roll No. 252, heing a joint resolution calling for the mibmission to the people of the state a propoaltion to increase the number of supreme court judges, was up in the house today

to come up again later on. The bill is one to increase the number of judges from seven to nine and provides for the districting of the state into supreme judicial districts, each district to elect its own judge, the chief justice to be elected by the entire state. The districts, if the resolution is adopted by the people, will place the state into nine districts, as follows:

Redistricting State.
The First district will compose the entire state and will elect the chief justice.

Other districts are as follows: Second District—Richardson, Pawnec, Johnson, Nemala, Otoc. Casa, Sarpy and Saunders, with a population of approximately 120,579 people, which at the last election cast about 27,000 votes.

Third District—Jefferson, Gage, Saline, Lancaster and Seward, with 15,721 people. Lancaster and Seward, with 154,731 people and about 30,000 votes.

Fourth District—Douglas county alone, with a population of about 168,548, according to the last census, and casting about
