Wager of the Missouri Pacific is in from an extended trip out in central Nebraska and returns with the fixed opinion that at this season of the year the agricultural sections of the state never looked more promising than now. The snow has about all melted and, having disappeared so slowly, the water has about all soaked into the ground. In many places the frost is pretty well out. In the counties along the Elkhorn and Laup rivers extra precautions is being taken to prevent flood damage when the ice moves out. County officials have men at work along all the streams, dynamiting the ice above the bridges to prevent the possibility of gorges. Railroad officials everywhere are taking similar precautions. In most of the streams the ice is covered by six inches to a foot of water, but in few localities has it shown any signs of breaking up.
