



## HARD TO GET TO WOUNDED

Ambulance Work on European Battlefields Now Carried on at Danger to Workers.

LAY FOR DAYS UNATTENDED

(Correspondence of The Associated Press.)
PARIS, Peb. IS—Since hostilities settle:
down to a slege along the rivers and
canals of the north, the average number of casualties per day seems to have lessened. But the work of the ambulance department is all the more hazardous. Men who fell in pitched battle were often lest in concealed places, but what is worse now is that they often lie in plain sight obliged to wait for hours, sometimes for days, before it is possible for their comrades to pick them up. It is

When a man is wounded in the trenches he is able to get back to the field hospital if he can walk, if not he mast wait until if he can walk, if not he maist wait until night because the trenches are so narrow that the stretcher bearers cannot curry a wounded man through them; he must be lifted out and carried back above ground. When a charge is made between the lines of trenches and proves to be unsuccessful, the wounded of course must be left; in too many cases they are actually sacrificed and their comrades obliged to see them tying helplessly between two fires. Sometimes they see them raise a hand and occasionally they hear their despairing cries, but to attempt

"Here and there were flashes of light, followed by the explosions of shells, and through the sky veritable furrows of fire. It was all that revealed the sinister presence of hostile armics. The silence was impressive at times; cut only by the cawing of crows and the reports of artillery. "We found Rozelieres deferted, ruined; only a few houses still standing and they only a few houses still etanding and they were burning. Representable was unrecog-nizable. We found thirty wounded, but

we could take only ten of the worst.

### URGE THE KNIFE FOR SNORES

Society of Women Undertaken to Bust the War Drums of Morpheus.

The recent strong pronouncement of a natrons' society against the habit of enoring comes as a grateful and refreshing diversion from the war topics. The matrons, it seems, regret the war, but being unable to stop it, they take occasion to speak plainly on matters closer to their own firesides. With more of regret than resentment the matrons deplore the spread of the habit of snoring, and suggest that the majority of cases may be easily and permanently relieved by a simple and almost painless surgical operation. A discussion of the subject at a recent session of the matrons brought out the interesting statement that more than 90 per cent of the loudest snorers are married men.

The society concluded that the subject was important enough to be worthy of special resolutions, and these were adopted for the purpose of directing general attention to the curative possibilities.

The information is given that the majerity of aggravated and aggravating cases arise from fungualike growths la the masal passage, and that excision of the growths brings immediate relief, both to the patient and to the members of his family who are required to alsop under the same roof with him.
