READ STEPS FAST, BUT LANDS IN JAIL

Weds Three Days After Reaching Omaha and Has Many Worthless Checks Cashed.

WAS JUST READY TO SKIP OUT

Elmer A. Read, aged 30 years, of Las Vegas, N. M., is held at the city jail for passing worthless checks. Read, who came here from Chicago last Tuesday, has during his short sojourn in the city met and married Miss Katherine O'Connor, 2404 Cass street, passed worthless checks on two department stores to the amount of \$155, beat a board bill at the Paxton hotel and broken the heart of the wife who innocently secured endorsements for his worthless bits of paper.

The only part of the whole affair that the fellow appears to regret is the fact that Detective L. T. Finn was shrewd enough to effect his apprehension before he could get out of town.

Married in Three Days. On arriving in the city Read started immediately to lay plans to cash the checks. Going to the Brandels Stores he struck up an acquaintance with Miss O'Connor, and after a courtship of three days secured her promise to wed him. He appeared at the store late Friday afternoon with a check for \$15, made payable to himself, and drawn on the First National bank of Plattsmouth to the account of G. M. Buhl. Through his prospective bride he secured the endorsement of H. F. Pillsbury, floor manager, and cashed it at the Brandels bank.

Married Saturday. Saturday evening Miss O'Connor and Read took a taxi to the home of Rev. Hugh B. Spear, 303 Cass street, and were married. The couple planned to start on their honeymoon Monday evening, leaving Omaha on the Missouri Pacific at 11:15 for Kansas City. From Kansas City they were to visit relatives at Las Vegas, and from there journey to San Francisco, for the fair. At Las Vegas Read was to receive the remaining thousands of a \$5,000 legacy which his mother left him six months ago. To make his story good the fellow asked Rev. Spear to forward the marriage certificate to the Manhattan club of San Francisco.

Has Another Check. Late Monday afternoon Read appeared at the Brandels Stores and by the same methods he employed with the \$15 check, had one for \$25 drawn on the People's Trust and Savings bank of Carroll, Ia., to the account of K. W. Clemmons, endorsed by Sam Cohen, assistant superintendent of the store. This he cashed at 4 o'clock. In the meantime another check had been heard from the \$25 check and looking the matter up, the department found it bogus. At 4:15 Special Officer Finn had his ropes set to arrest Read.

Officer George Emery and Special Officer L. T. Finn entered the Henshaw hotel late Monday evening and at a table to the back of the cafe arrested Read, who, with his wife and her chum were ordering dinner.

Confesses, All. At the station Read confessed everything, stating Las Vegas was his home, and that he was developing man for the National Advertising company of Indianapolis up till two weeks ago.

Captain Dempsey gave the man a thorough piece of his mind Wednesday morning and as a result Read said he would make the checks good. On his person at the time of his arrest he had \$2 in cash. A number of good checks which he cashed while in the city, according to his own story, have not come to the notice of the police, although one for \$5, made out identically like the \$25 check, was brought to police headquarters from the Burgess-Nash Stores.

Read had left his grips at a saloon at Sixteenth and Leavenworth streets, and had ordered an expressman to call for them there. To the expressman he gave the name of A. E. Cline, 1321 Leavenworth street and his telephone number as 7, 1368. The latter was found by the police to be the number of a phone in a vacant apartment in the Hamilton.

Second Serum Plant Builds in Ralston

A second plant for the manufacture of serum for the vaccination of hogs against cholera is to be established at Ralston. This is to be known as the Ralston Serum company. South Omaha capital is said to be interested in the new company. Ground for the new plant already has been arranged for with the officials of Ralston. The company contemplates the building a 25,000 plant.

The Omaha Serum company, which a few weeks ago decided to establish its plant at Ralston, has already built one building 30x60 feet.

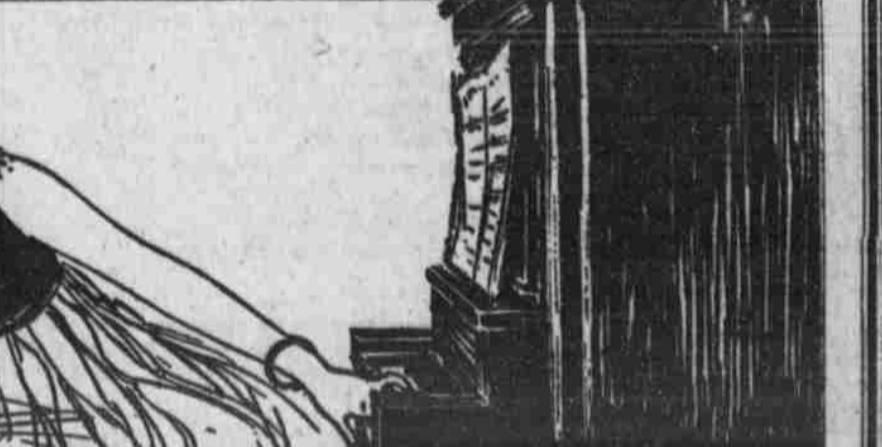
