MANY STATE SUITS DECIDED BY COURT

Orchard Citizens Ordered to Pay for Circulation of Stories About Townsman Who Ran Hotel.

INTERPRET INSURANCE CLAUSE

LANCOLN, Feb. 26.—(Special.)—The circulation of stories about Charles J. Dawson of Orchard, in connection with his operation of a hotel, by Sidney D. Thornton, Nels Lindquist, Ora J. Goldsmith, John Thomas Fletcher and Zachariah T. Hicks, businessmen of the same village, will cost them \$2,000, according to the decree of the supreme court, which has affirmed the decision of the district court of Antelope county. The opinion was written by Justice Hamer.

Term of Commissioner.
Ernest A. Calling will be permitted to act as county commissioner for the county of Dawson until 1917, according to a decision of the supreme court in the case brought by him against Archie S. Gilland. The case grew out of the adoption of the constitutional amendment providing for biennial elections. The plaintiff was elected for a term of four years, but Gilland was elected and qualified for the position at the expiration of the term. Calling maintained that a vacancy did not exist and the court held with him, so that his term will not expire until 1917, or for a period of two years of his successor's term.

The same principles were involved in the case of Robert Saling against K. D. Bahensky, county clerk of Howard county, and the finding of the lower court was affirmed.

Action on Policy.
The finding of the district court of Lancaster county in the case of G. Robert Hewson et al. against the Royal Highlanders, is reversed by an opinion handed down by the supreme court, and the court directed to enter a judgment for the plaintiff in accordance with the motion of the defendants during the trial of the case. G. Robert Hewson committed suicide April 23, 1911, and his heirs sued to collect on a policy held by him for \$2,000. The terms of his contract with the fraternal order were that his heirs should receive the sum which he had paid into the order if he should commit suicide, and they offered to settle on this basis, which amounted to \$31.20. The case was tried and the plaintiffs received a verdict for \$2,200. This finding was set aside and the court ordered to settle with the plaintiffs for \$31.20.

Receivers for Legal Services.
John F. Stout, surviving member of the partnership of Hall & Stout, may recover \$2,800 with interest amounting to \$694.33 from the Omaha, Lincoln & Beatrice Realty company, according to the supreme court, which has affirmed the judgment received by the plaintiff in the district court of Lancaster county. The plaintiff sued for \$2,000 for legal services.

Judgment Affirmed.
The judgment received by Nikola J. Jerich against the Union Pacific railroad in Omaha has been affirmed by the supreme court. Jerich sued for injuries alleged to have been received by him while he was in the employ of the highland company at its shop in Omaha.

Reversal of Judgment.
The inability of the court reporter to transcribe and get up a bill of exceptions in fifteen days following the dismissal of the case of Katherine Ferber against Frank Leise of Cedar county, and the failure of the trial judge to remember a promise made to grant an additional forty days for the filing of the bill of exceptions secured a reversal of

Judgment received in the Cedar county district court from the supreme court.

Bethany School Site Case.
The famous Bethany school case, hard fought in the courts and at the polls, between the citizens of the northern and southern portions of that Lincoln suburb, has been decided by the supreme court.

The court holds nothing else may be involved with the submission of the question of the issuance of bonds, not even the proposition of purchasing an unspecified new site.

Changes Priority.
The supreme court holds that the date of the appropriation of the altair irrigation district was September 16, 1882, instead of June 1, 1882. The holding modifies a former judgment of the district court and an order of the irrigation board. It bears on a contest brought by the Kearney Water and Electric Power company.

For the Farmer.
The supreme court affirms the judgment of Pawnee county district court in the case of Frank Haas against Frank Howard, to recover on a protested check given by a horse dealer to a farmer. The horse dealer claimed that the farmer misrepresented the horse he sold him as sound, whereas she was "a scribbler and a winducker." The jury found for the farmer on an issue of veracity, and the high court, in an opinion written by Justice Letton, says "Long experience has shown the writer that this is not an unusual result in suits of this nature."

Heirs Get Back Land.
Heirs of the Toop estate in Butler county are to get back the land that they sold under the mistaken impression that they owned only a one-third interest in it, the supreme court having affirmed the judgment returned in their favor in the lower court.

There were two sets of heirs, the plaintiffs and certain nonresident aliens living in England. The plaintiffs supposed that the others, being of an equal degree

of kinship, would come in for two-thirds of the estate. They were aliens, however, and nonresident, and under the laws of Nebraska could not inherit.

Mill Owners Win.
Goarhart & Benson, mill owners on the Arapahoe river, did not lose their water right by failure to demand adjudication of the same, according to a decision handed down by the supreme court today, affirming an order of the Board of Irrigation. Plaintiffs had used the water since 1829 but did not seek to have their right adjudicated until 1912. The Frenchman valley irrigation district, holding a water right on the same river, contested the application of the plaintiffs. Moreover the latter argued the doctrine of "the balance of convenience," namely that water for irrigation purposes was more necessary than water for milling purposes.

Wymore Church Calls Pastor.
WYMORE, Neb., Feb. 26.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the Baptist church congregation Thursday evening a call was extended to the Rev. Mr. Janzen of Guide Rock, Neb. The church has been without a pastor since last October, when the Rev. Mr. Hoge was called to Friend, Neb.
