

PROHIBITORY ACT SIGNED

Temperance Forces Make Show of Interest Over Affixing of Name.

HIGHWAY LAWS ARE UPHELD

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Ia., March 6.—(Special Telegram.)—The temperance forces made quite a show of interest in the process of signing the joint resolution proposing to amend the constitution for prohibition, and when the governor affixed his signature a large crowd gathered to witness it.

The pen he used was taken by Senator Thomas, one of the dry leaders, and in a speech he presented the same to Mrs. Edworthy of this city, the legislative agent for many years of the Women's Christian Temperance union.

The governor at the same time signed the resolution for the women suffrage amendment and the pen was given over to the representative of the state association of suffragists.

Uphold Highway Law. The senate made a good start toward showing its position in upholding the highway laws of the state today, by passing almost without opposition a bill to place the matter of road grading on the same basis as bridge and culvert work as to letting by contract on big jobs.

Wouldn't Stand for Home Rule. The house put in practically all of Friday morning on the bill for home rule, to give "home rule" to cities, towns and villages of the lower leagues of municipalities and as introduced, included the clause of the new Ohio constitution reserving to cities the right to govern as to their own local affairs.

Senate Does Much Small Work. The senate made a special order for next Thursday of the bill by Imball, to provide that judges of the district court and shorthand reporters shall have their expenses paid while traveling.

Bill by Senator Taylor—to include "offering or exposing for sale" in the law as to registered pharmacists. Bill by Senator Allen—to legalize as satisfaction of mortgages prior to January 1, 1915.

Bill by Representative Sullivan—Legalizing as to certain suits quieting title. Bill by Representative Sullivan—Legalizing as to release of liens, by administrators. Bill by Senator Whitmore—to legalize elections in Hakesbury.

Mill Owners Sued By Injured Employee

BEATRICE, Neb., March 6.—(Special Telegram.)—Benjamin Hagerman, who was so seriously injured in an explosion at the Black Bros. mill last September, which he was blown into the Blue river with the west wall of the building, today instituted a \$20,000 damage suit against the firm. He alleges the primary cause of the explosion was mill dust, which was allowed to accumulate by the owners of the mill, thus endangering his life.

Harry Doehle of Odell today brought suit for \$50,000 damages against Dell Gulgrove of that place because of injuries received in October, 1914, by being run over by an automobile driven by Calgrove.

HIGBEE AND MRS. ZIMMERER ARE IN COLUMBUS JAIL. COLUMBUS, Neb., March 6.—(Special.)—No inquest will be held over the body of Thomas Czarnick, who was shot to death on a farm north of Monroe, Sylvester Higbee now admits that he fired the fatal shot and his reason for doing so seems to be that the dead man was a bigger man than he. Both men were employed by Mrs. Gertrude M. Zimmerman on a farm, where they got into an altercation and Higbee seized his shotgun and shot his victim in the head.

HENRY PERRY, LITCHFIELD PIONEER, DROPS DEAD. LITCHFIELD, Neb., March 6.—(Special.)—Henry Perry, an old soldier of 70 years and a pioneer of this country, fell dead in his yard here Friday. Death was due to heart failure. Deceased served in the civil war and afterward located on a farm near here. Funeral services will be held Sunday at 2 o'clock.
