

WAR STORIES OF BACHINGER SEND HIM TO SANITY BOARD

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) VIENNA, Feb. 26.—A bookkeeper, Bachinger, who joined one of the local land-sturm regiments early in the war, has been enjoying a brief period of fame as a war hero here. Wearing iron crosses of the first and second classes, which he had taken from the bodies of Prussian soldiers while on ambulance duty, he told an elaborate story of his single-handed capture of the governor of Warsaw.

He was received in state by the chief burgomaster of Vienna and was presented with a purse full of money. When his story reached the German newspapers it met with prompt contradiction, and Bachinger was arrested. He has now been sent to a hospital for observation as to his sanity.

FILE A PROTEST AGAINST THE PRESS CENSORSHIP

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) VENICE, Feb. 28.—It is learned here that the Association of Journalists and Authors of Vienna has sent to the Austrian government a unanimous resolution to the effect that Austrian press censorship is being exercised in such a manner as to suppress totally all passing of public opinion finding expression. "and if the war of long continuance this state of things will become much more serious and dangerous."

ASTOR STARTS FUND TO RAISE MONEY FOR BANDS

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) LONDON, Feb. 18.—Rudyard Kipling, Israel Zangwill and the others who are working for more music among the recruits, received a big help when William Waldorf Astor gave £300 to the fund for bands, a fund which has now reached a total of about £2,000.

The spirit of this movement, launched at a public meeting at the Mansion House, is well explained by the often quoted remark of a contributor that "There has been steady revolve, but not quite enough joy in this recruiting campaign," or, as W. J. Locke, the novelist, expressed it, "To see our new armies moving along like silent shadows on a sunless road has been heartbreaking."
