Oppose Torrens Bill

"If the legislature opens the door to the so-called Torrens system of land title registration, it will mean confiscation and added expense for real estate owners instead of simplifying matters," is the declaration of local abstracters. "No, we are not making a fight against the with our business, but we helieve if the lawmakers knew what was involved they would healtate to try an experiment that has resulted disastrously whenever attempted under like circumstances. All we have done is to send a letter to the members of the degislature calling their attention to certain facts,'

The letter refers to the enactment of the Torrens act in Obio, and its subsequent repeal, and quotes from the de cision of the Ohio supreme court declaring the scheme unconstitutional. It also gets forth the following reasons for holding to the present system of title trans-

expensive than the present system.

2. If the Torrens system has any advantages over the present method it should be compulsory, then the county would not be at the expense of carrying on a double system of registration and recording of land titles.

on a double system of registration and recording of land titles.

A in all states where the Torrens system is in force the records show that only those who have bad and doubtful titles take advantage of the act. The county and state therefore goes into the business of insuring had risks and consequently the public is indirectly compelled to bear the loss incurred through the registration of defective titles.

4. Only the first registration of a land title is judicial, the subsequent registrations are merely ministerial, and it is doubtful if any one would loss money on a ministerial registration.

5. The insurance laws of the state provide for the insurance of land titles. The present law, however, requiring a deposit with the state board of \$100.000 in securities should be amended by reducing the deposit in securities to \$20.00, for the reason that an abstract and insurance company in a city the size of Omaha must first invest a sum of not less than \$100.000 in compiling a set of abstract books, including indices of all judgments, decrees, suits pending, estates, etc.
