ACCUSED WOMAN ON STAND

Mrs. Helen M. Angle Says Mate Killed by Fall Down Stairs After Taking Drink.

WITNESS APPEARS WORN

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., March 16.—Mrs. Helen M. Angle, accused of having caused the death of Waldo R. Ballou in Stamford the night of June 23 last, told a jury today her story of Ballou's visit to her apartments on the night he met his death.

Felt Lonesome. Mrs. Angle said she felt lonesome and called up "Jimmy" on the evening of June 23.

"Who is Jimmie?" "Mr. Ballou."

The witness said Mr. Ballou came over and brought a bottle of wine. She did not care for wine and, at her suggestion, Ballou procured whiskey from the medicine chest and poured out a small drink for her and a larger one for himself.

Ballou left, the witness said, about half-past 10. She was preparing to go to bed when she heard a noise. She decided to investigate.

"At the foot of the stairs I came upon Mr. Ballou," she said. She told of trying to get him on his feet.

"I did the first thing that occurred to me," she continued, describing how she had taken him downstairs and out to the sidewalk. She then rushed upstairs.

The witness then told of the visit of Chief of Police Brennan to her rooms soon afterward. Brennan asked "what had happened between Ballou and herself."

Nothing, Bill. "Nothing, Bill," the witness said she replied, "nothing."

Mrs. Angle looked worn. Her answers were made calmly and in a low voice.

She described how she had been employed at various times as a clerk. She was married in 1888 to Frank Angle, but obtained a divorce on grounds of desertion several years later. She met Ballou in 1911 about a year and a half after the death of his wife.

"We were good friends," she said, and added that she had gone out frequently with Ballou. She also enumerated various gifts which Ballou had given her.

"Did he appear to think very much of you?" "Very much. He asked me several times to marry him. I told him I did not wish to as he was very old. I also reminded him that he had grown children, and because of that I did not think it advisable."

ITALIAN NAVY IS CONCENTRATING

Fuka Eugene for a consultation before deciding the questions presented to him. The Tribune's London correspondent telegraphs that Talaat Bey, the Turkish minister of war, is having great difficulty in persuading the sultan to transfer the capital from Constantinople to Koroner in Asia Minor.

A special train is said to be held in readiness constantly to transport the government funds and archives to Kononieh if Adrianople is evacuated. Turkish troops are reported to be concentrated at Constantinople and along the Dardanelles.

Batteries Silenced. PARIS, March 15.—Several batteries of Turkish field artillery posted above Kum Kale, at the entrance to the Dardanelles, were discovered and silenced by British warships after a bombardment Sunday, says a special dispatch from Athens.

A special dispatch from Rome says the government has issued an order expelling from Italy the correspondents of the Vienna, Tageblatt and the Frankfurter Zeitung.

American Acts as Mediator. WASHINGTON, March 15.—The part played by American diplomats and consular representatives in the negotiations looking to the surrender of Smyrna in Asiatic Turkey, which failed, is told in dispatches just received by the State department from the American legation at Athens, Greece.

The message, dated Sunday, stated that the bombardment of Smyrna by the French fleet had continued feverishly from March 3 to March 9, when the American legation was advised by wireless that Admiral Pierce of the British fleet had a communication to deliver to the Ottoman authorities at Smyrna and asked that it be transmitted through the American consul general there.

Consul General Horton went to Vourlah, near Smyrna, and boarded the British flagship Eurymachus. He received a statement addressed to the governor general, saying that if the governor general would order the dismantling of all fortifications, and no further effort would be made to land the place could continue under Turkish control. Money for relief of war sufferers was also promised by the admiral and a truce was to go into effect until the morning of March 11.

Consul General Horton reported that the Turkish general's answer was a flat refusal, whereupon the bombardment was continued on March 11.

Governor Byrne Vetoes Money Items

PIERRE, S. D., March 15.—(Special Telegram)—Governor Byrne today cut out of the general appropriation bills an amount of \$17,000 for the insurance department on the ground that the law requires the expenditures from the receipts instead of by general appropriation. Eighteen thousand dollars was cut out of the appropriation for the state militia, \$1,000 out of the appropriation for the railway department and \$5,000 for carrying out the provisions of the primary law.

He vetoed a deficiency of \$1,000 for the state department on the ground that the law limits the expenditures of that department to the receipts and \$1,000 for live stock at the Cottonwood experiment farm.

The total appropriations for all purposes for the session are given at \$2,475,472.28, a reduction of \$2,377.38 from two years ago.

GERMANS MOVE CANNON CLOSER TO OSSOWETZ

tain tops held by the Russians, while the Tuscians, on the other hand, maintain that they are more than holding their own in these regions. Weather conditions in the Carpathians, where the snow is deep, make the movement of troops difficult, men on skis being the only forces able to operate freely. The Tuscians are bombarding Przemysl with heavy batteries while the Austrians still are hammering away in their efforts to relieve the fortress.

On the western front the German attack on St. Etienne evidently was made to counteract the effect of the British success at Neuve Chapelle. Berlin contents itself with claiming that progress has been made in this region, while Paris contends that the British have re-won most of their lost trenches there.

British Fear Effect on Neutrals. With the exception of a few newspapers which are inclined to the belief that a formal blockade would be a better method of accomplishing the desired result, virtually the whole British press commends the order in council setting forth the British retaliation measures against the submarine blockade of Germany. Many editorial writers express uneasiness as to the effect this order will have on neutrals and they advance a plea for forbearance on account of the extraordinary conditions which caused the promulgation of this retaliatory announcement.

British Semi-Weekly Report Announces Taking of Trenches

LONDON, March 15.—The regular semi-weekly report on the progress of the fighting was given out today by the British authorities. It is dated March 13 and reads:

"Since the last announcement of March 11, the operations in the neighborhood of Neuve Chapelle have been continued. The line captured March 10 and 11 to the east of that village has been consolidated and held in spite of repeated efforts on the part of the enemy to take it. During the night of March 11-12 and in the early morning of the 12th several counter attacks to the east of Neuve Chapelle were

repulsed and sixty prisoners were captured.

"The same night, a skillfully executed enterprise to the east of Armentieres resulted in the capture by us of the village of Leipinette with small loss. The possession of this village advances our lines in this quarter 300 yards on a front 300 yards wide.

"Fighting in the Neuve Chapelle area was very severe. March 12. Strong counter attacks by Germans in the afternoon were repulsed and 612 more prisoners were taken. The Germans continued to deliver minor counter attacks during the night of March 12-13 and throughout the 13th. In no cases did they succeed in recapturing any of the ground they lost.

"March 14 the fighting was confined mainly to the artillery. The prisoners in our hands taken since March 1 number 1,700, of whom thirty are officers. Judging from the number of dead counted on the ground the total

German losses during the operations from March 10 to March 13 on the Neuve Chapelle cannot be less than 17,000 or 18,000.

"During the evening of March 14 the enemy rushed some of our trenches to the south of St. Etienne after a heavy bombardment and the explosion of a mine. The greater portion of these trenches were recaptured this morning. The fighting in this area continues.

"The royal flying corps secured further successes during the last few days, although the fog at times interfered materially with their work. March 12 the railroad junction at Don and Doula were attacked with bombs and damaged and on March 13 a train in the Don station was blown up."
