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NEXT BIG BATTLE IN WEST

Belgians and Germans Preparing for Great Struggle Along the Ypres River

HEAVY FIGHTING IN THE EAST

LONDON, March 19.—The next important battle on the western front, it is believed, will take place along the River Yser, held on one side by the recently reorganized Belgian army and on the other by the Germans.

As the floods have subsided, the Belgians, supported by the warships of the allies, have already pushed their line slightly forward, and this is almost certain to lead to counter attacks by the Germans and a general engagement, as has been the case when similar movements were initiated elsewhere, along the front.

Heavy fighting is going on in the Russian Poland and eastern Galicia. The Russian official dispatches report the capture of several villages and heights to the northeast of Przasnysz, in territory where some of the fiercest fighting of the war has occurred.

Although the opposing forces in the Carpathians and East Galicia are struggling in their utmost in the deep snow and under the most trying conditions, no change worthy of note has taken place in the situation.

Austria is reported to be continuing work on the fortifications all along the Italian frontier, and the garrisons have been reinforced by artillery and infantry.

Switzerland advises that the Germans are building two strategical railroads on the Alsace-Lorraine frontier in order to strengthen the Strassburg system of fortifications.

A Zeppelin has attacked Calais, dropping bombs with the object of destroying the railway station. This met with no success, but seven persons were killed.

Another British steamer, the Glenartney, from Bangkok for London loaded with rice, has been torpedoed by a German submarine off Beachy Head in the English channel. Only one of the crew was drowned.

The entire Sudan, including Kartum and also parts of Nubia, are held by the Derwishes, according to the story told by a German merchant, who has returned to Berlin from Egypt.

The British foreign office are to the effect that Turkish soldiers in the Urumiah district of Persia recently killed several hundred civilians and looted and burned villages.

Three steamers carrying American meat products, which had been detained by the British government for examination, have been permitted to proceed. They are the Norwegian Elsa, the Swedish Grekland and the American A. A. Raven.

The German Reichstag has adopted, without debate, the war estimates and also passed the foreign estimates.

LINCOLN, March 19.—(Special Telegram.)—With over 300 crowding the tables at the Lincoln hotel the fourth annual banquet of the Nebraska Legislative league was held last night.

Representative Osterman, Senator Mathe and ex-Governor George Sheldon, who were on the published program, were not able to attend. Speeches were made by Governor Morehead, Chief Clerk George W. Potts, Thomas J. Majors, Edwin Jeary, A. E. Sheldon, E. E. Howell, Charles W. Hoal, J. P. Palmer, J. M. Norton, W. P. Dale, C. P. Peterson, J. A. Ollis, Congressman Randall of California, formerly from Nemaha county; Congressman Charles Sloan and J. H. Thielen.

The talks were mostly in a humorous vein, and most of the speakers did not attack very closely to their subjects.

A poll of legislators present from previous sessions, beginning with 1887, showed at least one present from all with the exception of the sessions of 1871, 1872, 1873, 1877, 1883 and 1885. In 1903 Meredith, now in the house, was the only democrat in the senate.

FIRE DESTROYS SIOUX CITY PLANT; LOSS \$90,000

SIOUX CITY, Ia., March 19.—Fire, which broke out in the C. T. Hopper Furniture and Mattress Manufacturing plant at 1 o'clock this morning, entirely destroyed the property, and for a time threatened to wipe out the lined oil mills.

Several box cars on side tracks near the plant were destroyed before they could be got out of reach of the flames. The loss to the manufacturing concern is estimated at \$90,000. The origin of the blaze is unknown.

Officer Holden Takes Two Razors and Two Guns from Old Man

George A. Edwards, 75 years of age, and for the last seventeen years paralyzed in the limbs, suddenly pulled a razor from his pocket and attempted to cut the throat of his wife, who is 71 years of age. Mrs. A. McCombs, who is visiting with Mrs. Edwards at the home at 2322 Corby street, took a hand and incapacitated Edwards from further activities by a well directed punch on the jaw and then called the police. Officer Johnny Holden responded to the call and as he entered the house Edwards pulled a revolver from his pocket and placed it against his temple. Holden took the gun away from him only to have him pull another one from another pocket. The officer also took this revolver, whereupon Edwards pulled another razor. This exhausted his supply of weapons, so Holden, when he had taken that away from the old man, took him to the police station for safekeeping. Edwards was arraigned in police court Friday morning and was sent to the county hospital for fifteen days, pending an investigation. His wife testified that they had been married a little over a year. He was an employe of the Union Pacific shops for a great many years.
