### EGGS BOUGHT FOR STORAGE

Pork and Lambs Are Both Up and Ham and Eggs Are Higher.

### SUGAR ALSO HAS MOVED UP

Now that eggs have come down almost within reach of the poor man, the storage houses have already begun buying them to store. Storage of eggs is already in process, and the result is that

eggs have leaped up a little in the last week. They sold for 15 and 16 cents a dozen a week ago, but have come back to 20 cents, and are expected to reach 22 cents for Easter Sunday when a majority of people want eggs for breakfast. Butter is off a little. The best creamery butter is sold in cartons now at 30 cents.  
 Pork is up 11 a hundred. Spareribs are 8 cents a pound. Neck bones are 4 cents. Beef is up 11 a hundred. Round steak is 12 1/2 cents. Shoulder steak is 12 1/2 cents. Pot roasts can be had for a dime. Boiling beef is 8 1/2 cents.  
 Lambs are 50 cents per hundred higher. An advance is looked for in all smoked

meats by Easter, when the ham-and-eggs habit will create a healthy demand for hams and bacon.  
 Sugar is up 30 cents per hundred wholesale; and, while seventeen pounds retailed for a dollar a week ago, only sixteen are given for that price now. Flour is up a dime a sack.  
 Strawberries are still a half dollar a box, but it is expected that for the Easter demand they can be had at 20 cents a quart.  
 Green stuff from the south is somewhat scarce, owing to the recent cold weather and the heavy rains in the south. For a few days it has been almost impossible to get radishes.

### PATTERSON SAYS WEATHER IS WARMER IN THE WEST

Chief Patterson of the secret service department of the Union Pacific came in from Denver and asserts that all through the western part of Nebraska the weather is spring-like and warm, instead of being cold and raw as here. He says that Thursday west of North Platte many of the farmers were working in their fields, plowing and seeding. Cattle are out on the range and the grass is beginning to show green.
