Heavy selling to realize profits for holders had left the wheat market open to a bearish attack late in the session, a large part of the offerings having passed into weaker hands. Stop lose orders were quickly reached about a half hour before the final bell, much nervousness being shown over the chance that a split would ensue between Austria and Germany. Assertions that recent export business in flour had been a great deal overestimated counted also in changing sentiment abrupily against the bulls.

Higher prices at Liverpool had considerable to do with lifting the wheat market before the late reaction. There were also reports of unlooked-for Turkiah successes in the Dardanelles and the Black Sea and of huge import requirements of wheat for Italy—18,500,400 bushels. Large export clearances, a murnbor of crop complaints, and a big cut in Minneapolis stocks gave further temporary help to the bulls.

Corn was strong early with other grain, but assged quickly when they turned weak. The bulk of transactions were between pit speculators. Lightness of offerings tightened the oats market until the bear furry in all staples took place near the end of the day. Shipping rates were small.
