HOAGLAND MADE PRESIDENT

State Laundrymen's Association Elects Officers at Its Closing Session.

MEET NEXT AT GRAND ISLAND

L. R. Hoagland of Hastings was re-elected president of the Nebraska Laundrymen's association at the closing session at the Henshaw hotel. John H. Hinchey of Omaha was made vice president. A. E. Evans of Lincoln was re-elected secretary-treasurer. These officers, with two other members, constitute the board of directors. The two members of the board are R. E. Seagr of Omaha and J. A. Westling of Patribury.

Grand Island was chosen as the place for holding the next convention. H. A. Jacobberger of Omaha talked strictly shop to the convention during the morning session. He discussed the minutest detail of the work, from marking to wet wash, and from the price of soap to the cost of checking, and a hundred things that are of vital interest to the business. He said the institution of the nine-hour law made a difference of 10 per cent on the payrolls of the laundrymen of the state, and that he looks for an eight-hour law to be put into effect before long.

J. A. Barkley of Chicago, president of the national association, in his talk before the convention gave statistical figures to show that the laundry business of the United States amounts to \$128,000,000 a year, and that 50 per cent of this amount goes right back to American labor in the shape of payrolls. He stated that the laundry business ranks fourteenth in the United States in the manufacturing class in volume of business done.

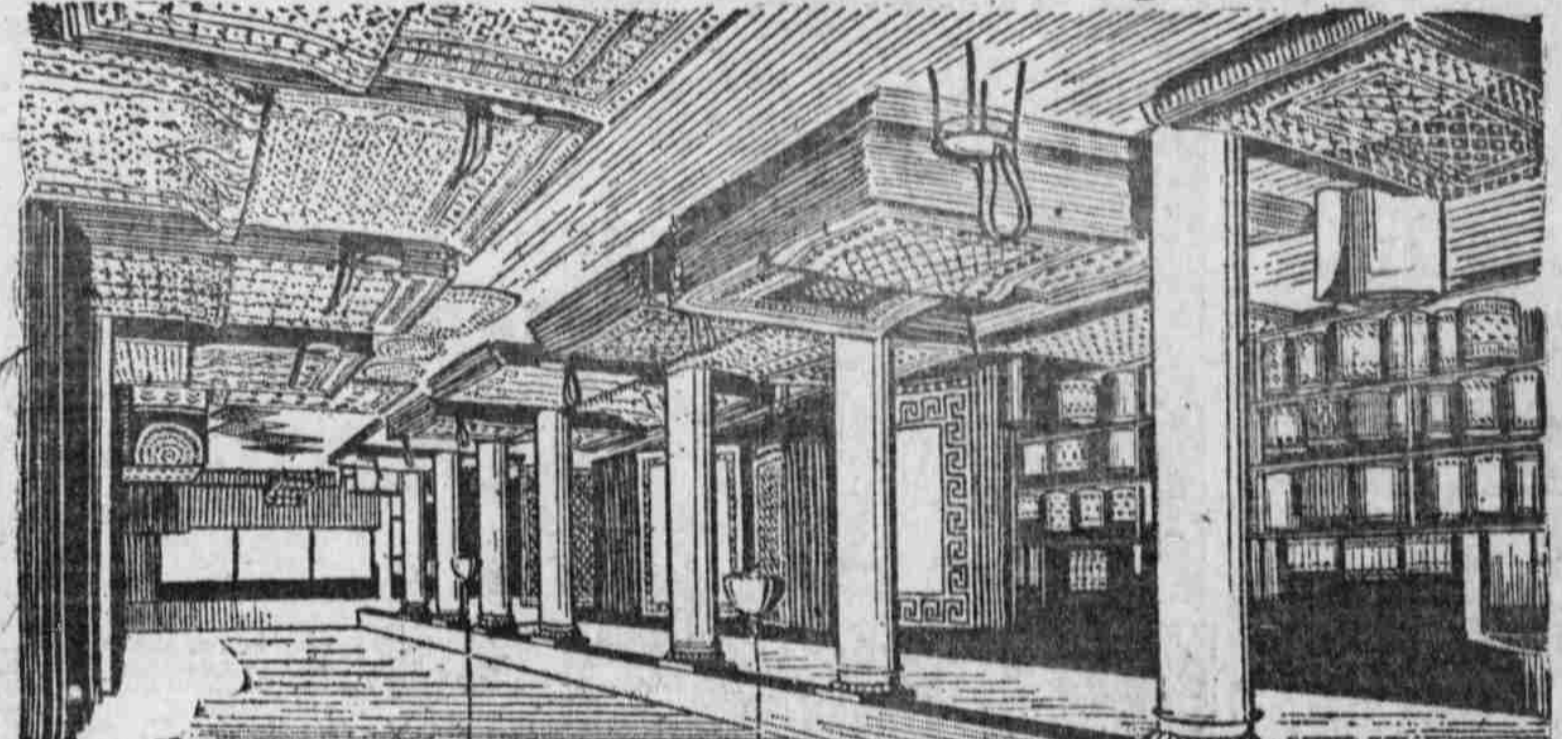
