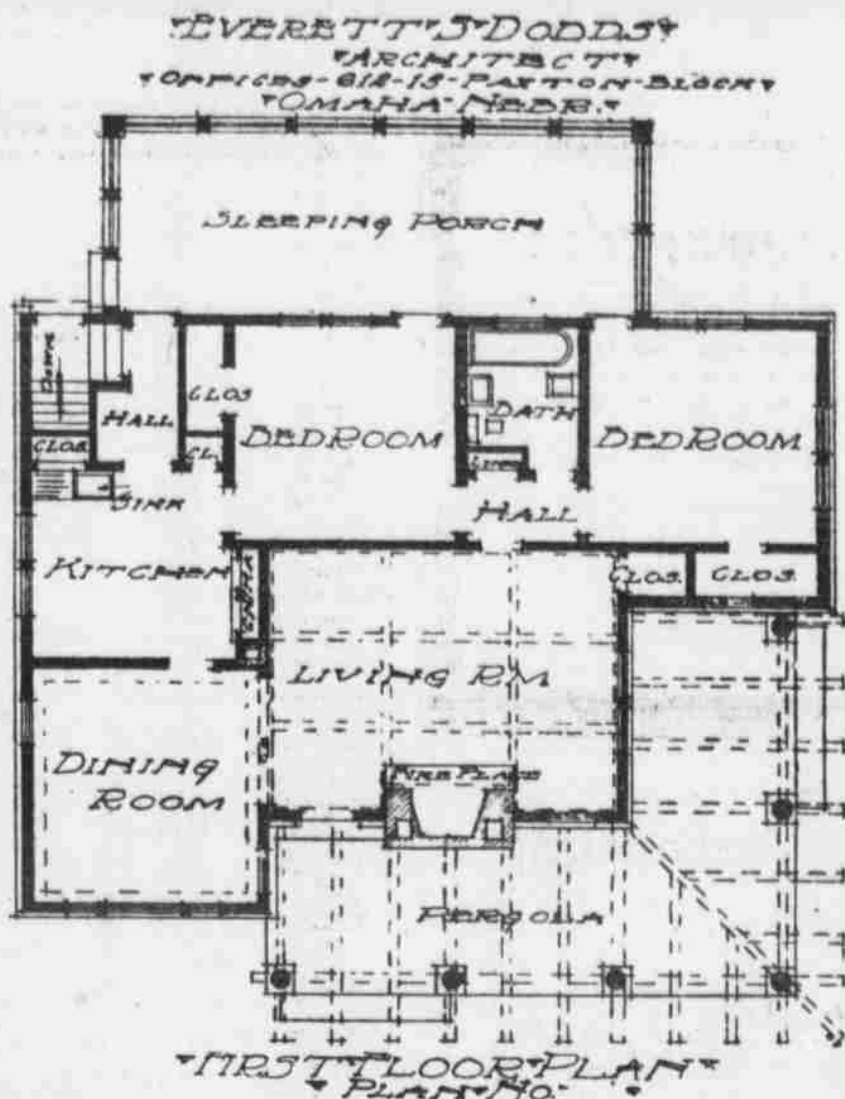
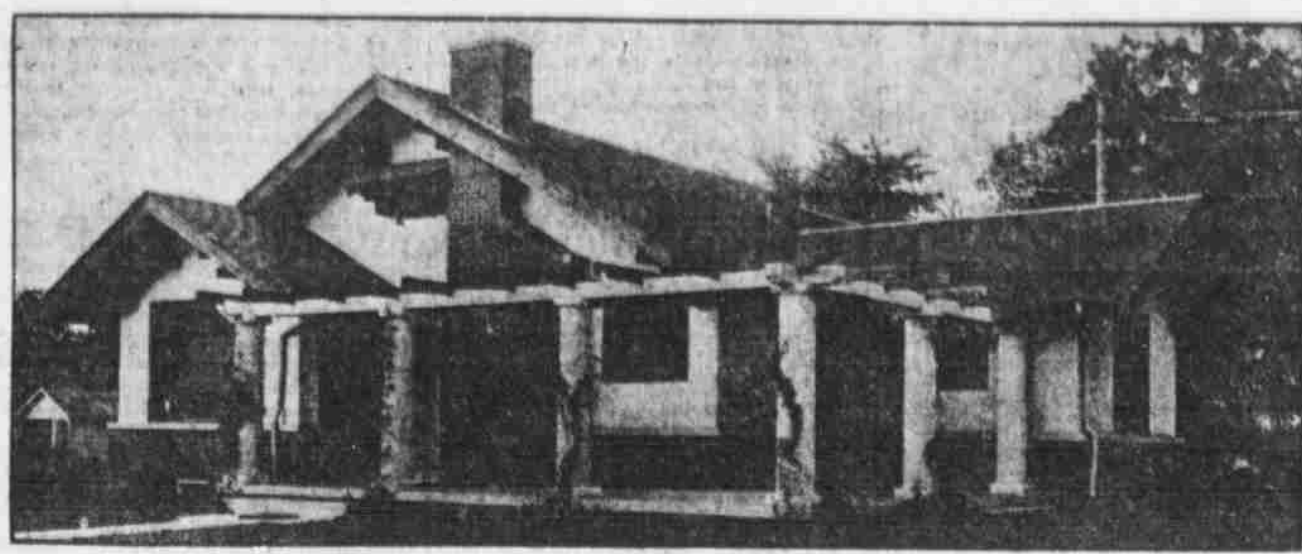

The design shown above is one of the most attractive homes on the prettiest mile in Omaha and is built of brick and stucco. The plan consists of five rooms and bath and sleeping porch. A small hall separates the two bedrooms and leads to the bath and the linen closet off it. The living room and dining room are separated by a large cased opening and have a heavy beam ceiling and wall cornice.

In the living room is a massive fireplace with a heavy wood shelf. The porch is covered only by a heavy pergola which extends around the side to the rear projection.

**HY-TEX BRICK CONTRACTED FOR MONTANA BUILDING**

Among Omaha's out-of-town visitors last week was Henry Hill Johnson, one of Seattle's leading architects. This was Mr. Johnson's first visit in Omaha and he was impressed very favorably with the remarkably healthy condition of building and construction work in this city. While here he completed negotiations with the Hydraulic-Press Brick Company for the furnishing of 70,000 hy-tex gray brick for the new Fred & Skinner building being erected in Great Falls, Mont. The plans for this building were drawn by Mr. Johnson.

**McVann to Submit Brief in Southern Lumber Rate Case**

E. J. McVann of the traffic bureau is to go to Washington Monday to submit to the Interstate Commerce commission a brief in the southern hardwood lumber case, in which testimony was taken in June at St. Louis before a special examiner. McVann and J. R. Walker, who represents the Southern Hardwood Traffic association, will jointly submit the brief. They represent the shipping interests that are protesting against the proposed increase in freight rates on hardwood lumber.

Before returning to Omaha McVann is to go to Boston to attend the meeting of the National Industrial Traffic league, which begins its session August 12.

The trip is now assured. Douglas lies in the heart of a Wyoming trade territory that Denver is trying to get away from Omaha. Omaha recognizes this fact. It has recognized it for some time. There is a possibility that many Omaha firms will have booths and exhibits at the fair.

**FOREIGN MONEY ORDER RATES ARE REDUCED**

A general reduction in charge for foreign money orders was effective in the United States postoffices on August 1. The new order reduces the charge for international money orders and numerous aliens' living in Omaha have postponed their usual remittances home on account of the reduction promised by the department. The foreign money order business has been very small during the last week, as compared with other weeks of the last month, but beginning early Saturday morning there was a flood of business at the money order windows of the post-office. The rate for smaller amounts of foreign money orders is reduced to approximately half of the former charge.
