INSPECTING SERUM PLANTS

Seventeen of them in Nebraska Require Attention of State.

OFFICIAL BEGINS HIS DUTIES

Automobiles on the Increase in Number in Nebraska, According to Figures Turned in by Assessors of State.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—There are seventeen serum plants in Nebraska and the law requires that they shall be inspected before August 1 of each year.

The state veterinarian has taken up the matter with these plants and he is informed that they have been ready for inspection for some time, but no inspector has been shown up.

Autos in Nebraska

According to assessors' reports on file in the office of the secretary of the State Board of Assessments 5,670 automobiles are assessed in Nebraska this year more than was given in at the 1913 assessment.

Last year the number was given as 5,242, the average value being \$88.79. This year the number is 5,670.

Last year Douglas county had 1,647 automobiles handed in for assessment, with an average assessed valuation of \$172.

This year Douglas county has 2,206 with an assessed value of \$222,938.

Arthur county has the smallest number of automobiles, the report showing eleven. Thomas county stands next with nineteen.

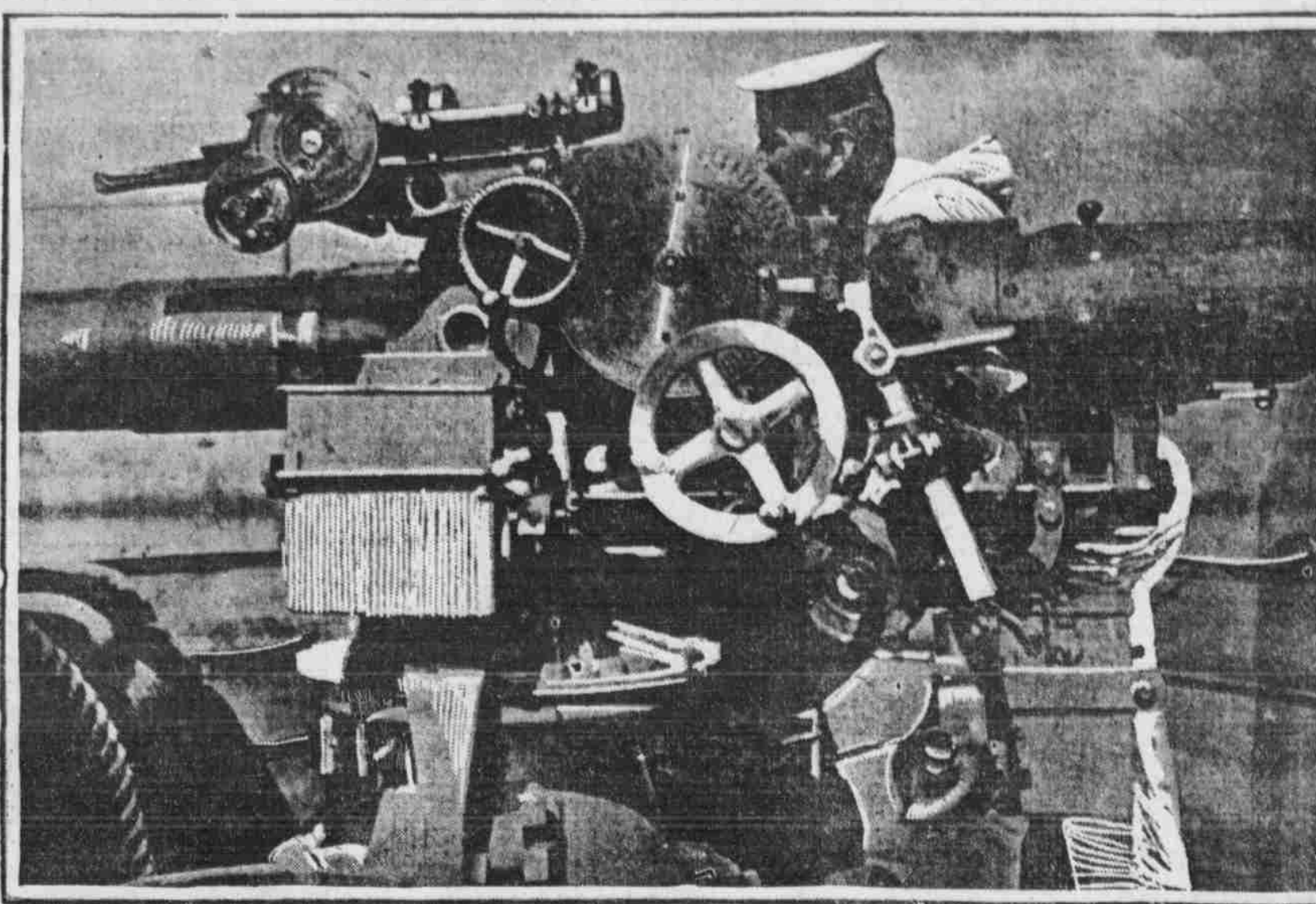
Miniature War on Boat

FORM CURRENCY ASSOCIATION

Iowa Banks Organize, with Capital and Surplus of Seven Millions.

WILL USE EMERGENCY PAPER Officers of Thirty-Three National Banks of Hawkeye State Sign Articles of Incorporation of Organization.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Ia., Aug. 4.—(Special Telegram.)—The National Currency association of Iowa was formed here with a capital and surplus of more than \$7,000,000 subject to the approval of the secretary of the treasury.

The president of vice presidents of thirty-three national banks of Iowa have signed the articles of incorporation and it is expected that others will sign, which will nearly double the capitalization of the association.

The organization is being formed for the purpose of putting into circulation the emergency currency for which act provides and which will relieve any stringency in money. About 150 banks were represented.
