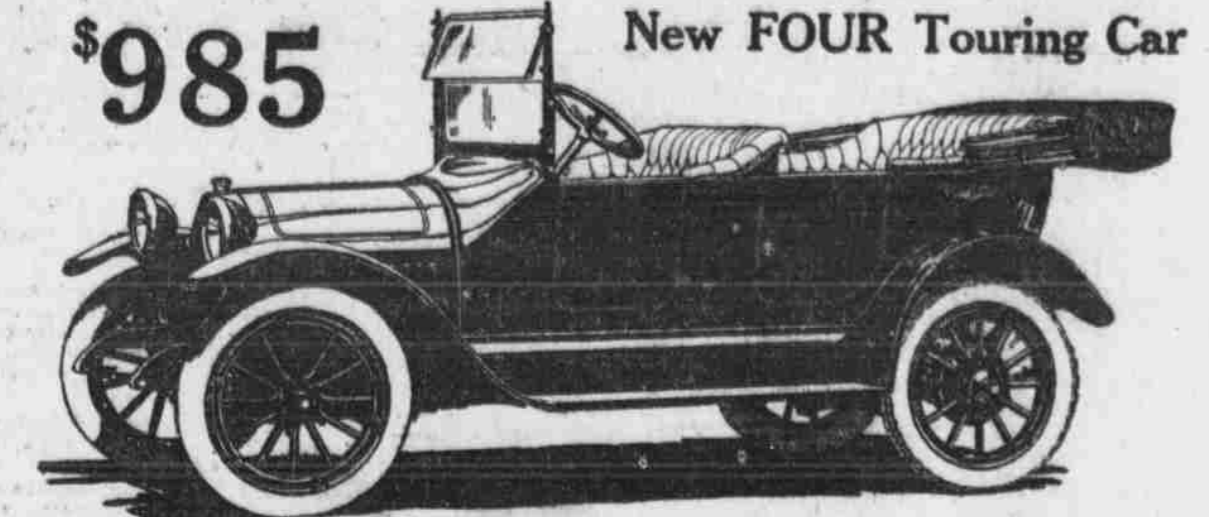

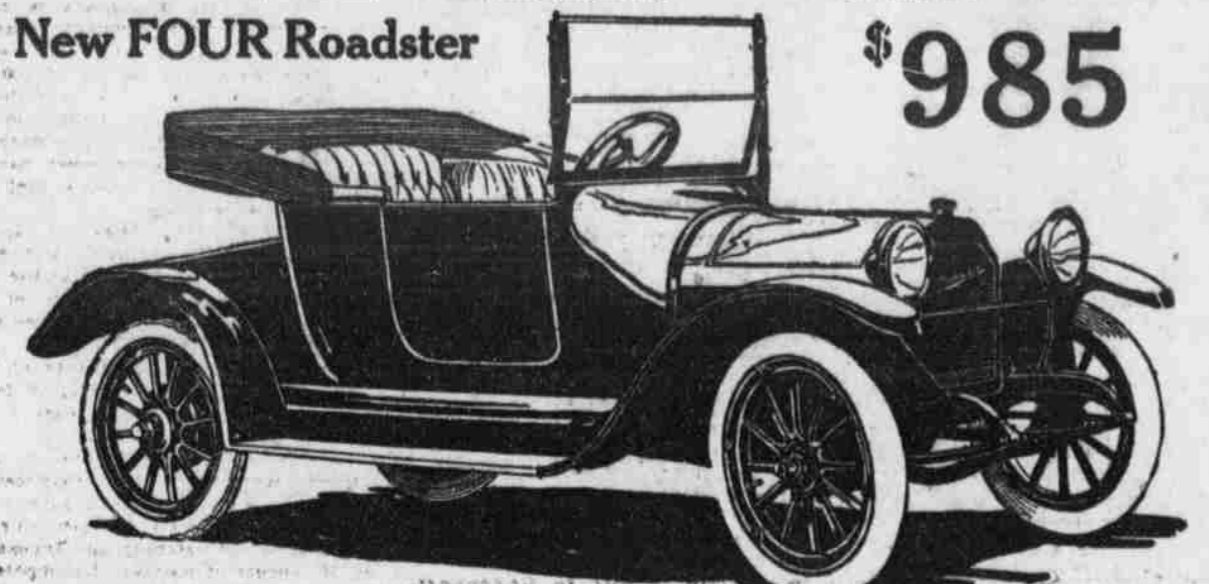

Destination of the Ship Wilhelm is Still a Mystery

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The destination of the steamer Kron Prinz Wilhelm of the North German Lloyd, which left this port last night with a cargo of coal and miscellaneous stores, was a subject of speculation in marine circles today.

The steamer after clearing Sandy Hook had only its running lights burning and was headed in a southerly direction instead of northward, which is the usual course for steamships bound for Europe.

The southerly route taken and the fact that the steamer had about 2,000 tons more of coal than it would need to cross the Atlantic, besides her stores, led to reports that it was going to sea to transfer supplies and fuel to the German cruiser Dresden, Strauburg and Karlsruhe, which have been reported as hovering in American waters.

The departure of the Wilhelm, it was feared in some quarters, might involve the United States in a neutrality controversy, but authorities agreed that gross negligence would have to be shown; also that the ship carried war materials.

Over Four Hundred Chicago Teachers Marooned in Europe

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—Chicago schools will be crippled by the absence of a large number of teachers marooned in Europe by war conditions unless the transport of non-combatants out of the scene of action is arranged for, it was said today. More than 400 teachers from this city are in

Europe, according to the records of the Board of Education, and attempts to get into communication with them have so far failed. Among those missing are Miss Ella Flagg Young, superintendent of Chicago schools, and her traveling companion, Mrs. Gertrude Howe Britton, who are thought to be in Berlin. A special dispatch from London today stated that the terminals' inspection committee of the Chicago city council, with whom Mrs. Young and Mrs. Britton had been traveling, had been unable to get word from either since they left for Germany.
