Wheat is Momentarily on the Bargain Counter.
WAR CHANGES CONDITIONS
Heavy Shipments Sold to European Buyers Will Likely Remain in the United States for Further Orders.
 OMAHA, Aug. 4, 1914.
 The ocean is closed to the export of breadstuffs and being unable to clear the country already sold for shipment to importing countries, they are resold here and it may be said that wheat is on the bargain counter at the moment. Prices closed with a more pronounced decline and had not the market been given much support late there would have been further more pronounced decline.
 A short time ago the breadstuffs market of the United States was in a healthy condition. Upward of 100,000,000 bushels has already been sold for shipment to Europe and there were many vessels to carry it over the ocean.
 It has changed all these conditions and instead of wheat being shipped abroad and the money there the wheat stays here with the growers or with those who have it to go out and the money remains over the water.
 While the war news spread out yesterday of a more pronounced character, the financial situation in the United States overbalanced this.
 There seemed to be a loss of confidence because of the revelation to the clearing house certificate measure. Margin calls of 10 per cent were made, and as either the traders were unable or unwilling to meet up this amount, the increase of 5,000,000 bushels in the visible crop, a reflection of what may be expected later, and the fact that the market had been heavily sold, all of which caused a price reaction of 2 1/2 to 3 per cent. Cash transactions were small.

 CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—Reports emanating from one of the largest houses on 'change that buying of American wheat had advanced started on a big basis put decided vigor in prices today near the close. The upward flurry that followed was the second which had taken place after the opening, and resulted in a spirited finish, 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 above last night. Corn scored a like advance, with oats 1 1/2 to 2 1/2. Provisions higher by 7 to 10 cents.
