GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

England is Short of Breadstuffs and Will Needs Imports

TRADERS FEEL MORE SECURE that All Shipments Into Domain Will Be Guaranteed by Government.

Advices from the United Kingdom say that the supply of breadstuffs held in the Liverpool and London markets is abnormally small and that not only the average traders, but miliers and bakers resithet supplies must be brought in within a short time or there will be more or less suffering among many millions of people who depend on the baker for the daily bread. There are now at Liverpool, according to advices to the Chicago Board of Trads, 75,000 berrels of flour and 1,28,000 bushels of wheat. On the ocean and bound for the United Kingdom there are 20,175,000 bushels of wheat, with flour included as wheat and 17,35,000 bushels bound for the continent, making a total of 87,512,000 bushels affoat with the destination the importing countries referred to. These supplies are a little larger than those of a week ago as well as a year ago. as a year ago.

The trade feit a little more secure in its position in the wheat market than at any time for more than a week. The advances of 2½ to 2½ cents for the day were the result of announcement that the London Corn Trade association has secured assurance from the British government that it will assume war risks on all its grain contracts destined to the United Kingdom. Considerable wheat was bought on this, and this buying was largely by shorts. The volume of trade, however, was small and it is likely to continue light until such time as the war situation will permit of broader markets. Cash wheat was weak, as buyers held off apd the trade amounted to only 5,000 bushels.
