

Nebraska WILL NOT RAISE DOUGLAS State Board of Equalization Accepts Explanation of Assessor.

Water Plant is Responsible His Amount of Valuation Taken Away from County on Account of Public Ownership of System and Planting Farm Lands.

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 11.—(Special.)—The State Board of Equalization held a session today to listen to the objection of representatives of different counties where the board had given out that a raise on lands would be made unless a showing was made which would cause them to change their minds.

Representatives from about twenty counties were present among them County Assessor H. G. Cousman of Douglas county, who objected to a 5 per cent raise contemplated by the board.

Mr. Cousman told the board that while the assessment on farm land was \$68,910 lower than the assessment of 1913, there was a reason for it and that in reality farm lands were assessed higher than last year.
