OMAHA, Aug. 19, 1314.

The lot of the wheat exporter is an unhappy one. The war caused him to cancel sales at losses and now he will be obliged to reinstate his holdings and ship the wheat as originally contracted. This, with a sale of 100,000 bushels of wheat for export yesterday and 1,000,000 bushels at the seaboard in two days and a report that the H. & O. railways has raised the embargo on wheat shipments to Baltimore, showed that a big outward movement to foreign countries is now a certainty. In addition to this as a buil help were reports from Monitreal of nine tramp steamers loading there with wheat and which are to depart as soon as loaded. There was a sensational market in wheat as shown by the closing prices, which were 13%-0419, above the reating spots of Monday. Following a weak spot at the opening, the buying power exceeded the offerings and there was but one side to the market from that time until the close.

CHICAGO, Aug. 19.—All Board of Trade markets except corn, which was hearishly influenced by rains in the southwest, scored further advances today. Wheat gained 1%20c; oats, 40%c and provisions 7050c, while corn declined 30%c.

Yesterday's reports of export sales, while unconfirmed were still bullishly influential in wheat, as was an advance in the Liverpool market. While the English apparently were not seeking wheat on this side and Montreal resold 500,000 bushels bought here yesterday, they were said to be in the market for flour. Other influences favoring the price were the estimate by an English expert of a reduction of 354,000,000 bushels in the European crop and export clearances, mainly from the suffer of 1.55000. Prices on Board of Trade. duction of 354,000,000 bushels in the European crop and export clearances, mainly from the guif, of 1,355,000 bushels. The volume of trade early was heavy, but it died down after the first hour.

Corn reached its best prices under the influence of wheat, but reports of rain in the southwest started profit taking, under which the gain was lost, together with some of yesterday's. While the country still withheld its old corn, shipping demand picked up unexpectedly. Advices on crop conditions provided nothing convincing.

The recent advance in futures was reflected in a lighter demand from shippers

of oats, Inis market declined under this influence, but recovered sharply on an excellent class of buying, which the concession in prices developed.

Higher hogs and a falling off in the western movements sent provisions up despite liberal profit taking.
