(Continued from Page One.) chosen their own battle grounds and have the Germans now in such a position that they cannot avoid fighting a battle in which two-thirds of their northern force will be engaged. If this is a fact, the main body of the French army has been rolled up into Belgium. This battle will decide the fate of Brussels if it is not already decided by giving it as a bait to Germany. It also will, in large measure, decide the fate of war on this northern side, perhaps of the whole war.

Gain Both Banks. A Havas dispatch from Brussels gives an official communication concerning the present state of the field operations in Belgium.

On the north, the allied Belgian and French armies have been able to repulse them, but on the north on the contrary, they have had a free field and could penetrate in small bodies far into the country.

Waste Fifteen Days. "In a word, the Germans have taken a number of our positions, but have wasted fifteen days in arriving at this result, which is greatly to the honor of our army."

"There is need for us to play into the hands of the Germans. That is the motive of the movement now being carried out. Far from being beaten, we are making arrangements for beating the enemy under the best possible conditions."

Corn Crop Placed at Nearly Three Billion Bushels

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—Production of 2,700,000,000 bushels of corn in the United States this year, in the forecast today of the committee on statistics and standards of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. Its report is based on data as secured on August 13. The outlook is for about a normal crop, since the average for ten years is 2,600,000,000 bushels.

The committee's report shows that conditions are very good in some sections and very poor in others, excessive rain in the early growing seasons and later drought have injured the crop in Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Missouri. Kentucky, Mississippi, Louisiana and Alabama suffered from a severe drought.

The prospective crop in the more important states are as follows: Kansas, 160,000,000 to 145,000,000 bushels; Nebraska, 160,000,000 to 200,000,000 bushels; Iowa, probably more than 600,000,000 bushels; Minnesota and Wisconsin, excellent prospects; South Dakota, yield in excess of earlier period; Missouri probably 175,000,000 to 190,000,000 bushels; Illinois, 25,000,000 to 30,000,000 bushels more than last year.

War Risk Measure is Favorably Reported to House and Senate

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The administration bill for war risks was favorably reported for action to both house and senate today after brief hearings in committee. It provides \$200,000,000 for war risk insurance by the government for ships of American registry during the European war.

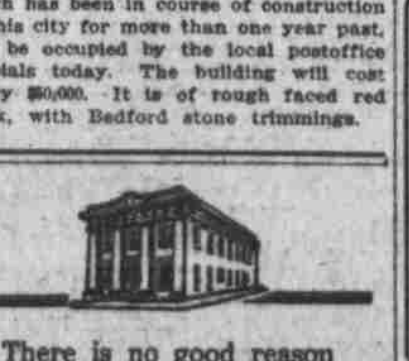
