

Retreat Conducted in Perfect Order to the Almost Impregnable Fortress.

PEOPLE ARE PANIC STRICKEN

New Capital of Little Kingdom Well Stocked with Food and Will Be Able to Withstand Long Slege.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 21 .- (Special Cablegram to New York World and Omaha the headquarters of the Belgian army. The first hint I got of what was afoot vas upon returning from Antwerp early

in the afternoon. At a crossroads below the railway line I met a whole corps of Belgian infantry marching away from Louvain. They were moving in perfect order and were in splendid condition, except they were dust-covered.

Further on toward Louvain I met with nany indications of what had happened A force of 2,000 men, or perhaps more had been left behind in trenches to meet the enemy and cover up the retreat of the main Belgian force, I learned

With these the Germans, who had adanced along three roads from Diest. Tirlemont and Eghezee, had a sharp encounter. The Beigians fought stubbornly. by all accounts, and their losses were far smaller than the invaders, as they have been in each engagement.

There was a story among some of the refugees that Louvain had been fired, but that scarcely seems likely. At all.

own burning Meets Crowd of Refugees. At this point I was stopped by an enormous crowd of refugees, some on foot and others in private vehicles and Red Cross cars. The gight of these folk being driven from their homes was pitiful. By far the greater number were women with young children whose fathers
