Nebraska MORE CAMPAIGN EXPENSE

Candidates Keep on Filing Statements of the Cost. BERGE PAID OUT OVER \$600

Candidate Who Ran Against Governor Morehead Sends Account from Pleasure Resort in Colorado.

LINCOLN, Aug. 27.—(Special)—Just what constitutes legitimate campaign expenses has caused considerable discussion around the state house because of the expense filing of a certain candidate for office who was known to have been preparing ammunition for the war several weeks before the campaign began and had one and part of the time two expert accountants working on the books in the different departments of the state house gathering statistics, which he filed with the voter by the picture machine method and in pamphlets and like manner.

George W. Berge, candidate for governor on the democratic ticket, sends in his expense account from a pleasure resort up in Colorado, though that does not indicate that there was much pleasure in the heart of Mr. Berge. He enclosed no letter of congratulation to Governor Morehead.

Nebraska MILITIA CAMP UNDER WAY

Nebraska National Guardsmen Are Now Encamped at Omaha. REGULAR ARMY MEN THERE

Militiamen Will Receive Instruction from Officers of United States Army During the Days of the Camp. From a Staff Correspondent.

LINCOLN, Aug. 26.—(Special)—Movement of troops for the state encampment of the Nebraska guard began this morning and by 9:30 all companies had been entrained and were on their way to the rifle camp at Ashland.

Major Haynes on duty the entire night, giving directions and answering inquiries coming to headquarters from the different companies, and this morning at 11 o'clock closed headquarters at the state house and went to the camp. The encampment will consist of all of the companies but E of the Fourth infantry, stationed at Schuyler.
