The Germans also will mount their heaviest guns at any port they seize and once more there will be an army encamped on the heights of Boulogne.

Let us, however, be grateful for one mercy. The international financiers, doctrinaires and lunatics who wish to fit us out with a channel tunnel are silenced for good and all.

French and English Surrounded. WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—The French and English north armies on the Sambre and Meuse rivers have been surrounded by German troops on all sides as a result of the latest fighting.

The appearance of a Zeppelin at Antwerp, the message continues, "has caused a panic in London.

Reports to Berlin from Copenhagen and Stockholm announce that there is grave crisis in the French government.

The Spanish ambassador at Vienna has called the situation in France very serious.

The Danish colony in Berlin has warned foreigners to beware of fictitious news.

A meeting today of all foreign colonies in Berlin was held, at which a resolution was passed thanking the German government and to express admiration for the wonderful spirit and enthusiasm shown by the German people.

Civilians of the Belgian town of Louvain made a perfidious attack on German troops while fighting. Louvain was punished by the destruction of the city.

FOUR MEN KILLED BY GASOLINE EXPLOSION. EUNICE, La., Aug. 28.—Four persons were killed and three probably fatally injured today near Saville, La., when gasoline in a tank car of the New Orleans, Texas and Mexico railroad exploded.

on the Indian army, the Indian frontiers will be fully and adequately secured.

As regards the risk of internal troubles, I believe that the enthusiasm, which prevails all classes and races in India, will make anything of the sort altogether impossible.

Russians Drive Wedge. The Russian armies by forced marches have driven a wedge between the German forces.

The authorities of East Prussia have caught the panic feeling from Germany's army. It is reported that the commandant of Marienberg has ordered the inhabitants to evacuate the country.

Both the Austrians and Germans accepted the invitation to this easy conquest. There are no soldiers anywhere to meet the German invaders.

Twelve Injured in Wreck. PORT SMITH, Ark., Aug. 28.—Twelve persons were injured, none fatally, today when Kansas City & Southern passenger train No. 1, southbound, was derailed near Marble City, Okl. A broken rail caused the accident.

GERMANS SAY ALLIES ARE IN FULL RETREAT

and satisfaction in Berlin than tidings of the fall of Paris.

It is reported here today that a portion of the British force is at present shut up in Maaubach.

The Berlin populace, inspired by the announcement from military headquarters that the "iron ring" is making its way around the French, British and Belgian forces from Cambrai to the Vosges, exhibits little concern regarding the situation on the eastern frontier of Germany.

Way to Paris Open. LONDON, Aug. 28.—(2:15 a. m.)—The Chronicle, commenting today on "the war's progress," says:

"Since the great disaster which befell the allies in Belgium a silence deeper than ever has been imposed by the censorships.

"From a message sent out twenty-four hours ago by the French embassy, showing fighting on the line between Mambri and Lacateau, it is apparent that the French have been driven back past their line of frontier fortresses to a point twenty miles beyond that line.

"There is no longer any serious fortification obstacle between the German advance and Paris. Under the circumstances it is not surprising that the French ministry has recommended itself as a committee of public safety. Meanwhile, as if a siege of Paris was now looming foremost in their minds, their first step has been to appoint a general in supreme command of Paris and its troops."

Both Sides Lose Heavily. LONDON, Aug. 28.—(2:45 p. m.)—Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons today that the British troops in Wednesday's fighting were exposed to the attack of five German army corps. The losses on both sides, he said, were great.

Premier Asquith said: "We have heard from Field Marshal Sir John French, commander-in-chief of the British expeditionary force, that in the fighting which took place between his army and the enemy on Wednesday, August 28, and which appears from French official reports to have been in the neighborhood of Cambrai and Lacateau, our troops were exposed to the attack of five German army corps, two divisions of cavalry and a reserve corps of cavalry, and a second cavalry division.

"Our second corps in the fourth division bore the brunt of the cavalry attack, while our first army corps was attacked on the right and inflicted a very heavy loss on the enemy.

"I regret to say that our casualties were heavy, but the exact numbers are not yet known. The behavior of our troops was in all respects admirable. General Joffre,

that the garrison and population fled.

The Russians have established a postal service in East Prussia and Russian stamps are used.

German Retreat to Koenigsburg. LONDON, Aug. 28.—(2:30 a. m.)—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Post, in describing the operations in East Prussia, tells of the difficulties which nature has placed in the way of the Russian advance and says the Germans have enormously multiplied these difficulties by modern adaptation of old methods.

Lakelets and marshes were sown with rifle pits, and wherever practicable redoubts of filled timber were placed. Everywhere there were formidable wire entanglements.

"We have no exact information," the correspondent continues, "of how many army corps Germany had left to oppose the Russian advance. Perhaps there were seven, and possibly only five. Whatever their number, three are retreating under cover of the forests of Koenigsberg, and one is in full flight on Osterode.

"All four flung away in retreat their arms and ammunition and even their food.

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Spokane State Bank is Robbed at Noon

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 28.—The State bank of Spokane, near the heart of this city was robbed in the noon hour today by a lone highwayman, who locked the assistant cashier in the safe, obtained \$1,000 in cash and escaped.

SHIP REGISTERED UNDER PROVISIONS OF NEW LAW

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The first ship to be registered under the American flag under the provisions of the recently enacted ship registry law is the Malmgaard, built in Norway in 1908 and owned by the Ocean freight line of this city. The papers of registry were signed today.
