FARM MORTGAGES DECREASE

Labor Commissioner Pool Compiles Statistics About Nebraska.

SHOWS SHIPMENTS OF GRAIN

Corn Sent from State in Greatest Quantity in 1911, While Wheat Was the Highest Last Year.

LINCOLN, Aug. 29.—(Special.)—According to a report prepared by Labor Commissioner Charles Pool, farm mortgages during the last five years have decreased from \$60,255,470 to \$41,000,000.

Chattel mortgages are shown to have been filed to the amount of \$32,925,225 in 1909 and increased to \$35,100,000 in 1911.

Surplus grain shipments from the entire counties of the state are shown as follows:

Farm mortgages reached the highest amount in 1912, when \$58,709,518 was placed on Nebraska farms.

Chattel mortgages reached the high point last year as shown above, and the releases showed the heaviest in the same year.

Corn reached its highest shipments in 1911, when 16,922,146 bushels were sent out.

The potato shipments were the heaviest in 1910, there being 3,744,675 bushels shipped.

Cattle reached the highest point in 1910, when 1,490,675 head were shipped.

Hogs reached the high point in 1911, there being 5,847,422 head sent out.

Sheep reached the highest number in 1910, with 1,352,788 head.

Eggs were a lively thing in 1910, there being nearly five times as many shipped as in any other year.

CRACK SHOTS AT ASHLAND

State Rifle Range Put on War Basis and Strictest Discipline.

LIEUT. CUNCLETON IS INJURED

Thrown from Uncontrollable Horse and Sustains Broken Arm and Internal Injuries—Only Accident of Encampment.

ASHLAND, Neb., Aug. 29.—(Special.)—The outskirts of Ashland held the camp of the Nebraska rifle range, where the crackshots of the state militia are practicing.

The camp has the appearance of a well-planned city and the roads leading to it have been repaired so that visitors by automobile are able to appreciate the manner in which the grounds are prepared and the camp pitched.

Fire wood is gathered from the woods near the camp and used for cooking purposes. The men gather it in the few spare hours they have.

Lieutenant Is Injured. Yesterday afternoon an uncontrollable horse threw Lieutenant Charles M. Cuncleton of the first battalion of the Fifth Infantry and he was taken to the hospital with a broken arm and internal injuries.

This has been the only serious accident during the two days of the encampment. The few minor bruises and insect bites have been cared for by the hospital corps, which is under the supervision of an excellent physician.

The camp is supplied with running water and shower baths from its own pumping station.

Sunday will be banner day and Governor J. H. Morehead will visit the camp. The troops will be reviewed at 2 p. m.

Monday the officers will visit the Ak-Sar-Ben in Omaha.

Adjutant General Phil Hall and staff are in direct charge of the camp.

NEW SORT OF VEGETABLE IN SALINE COUNTY

First of Masses for Repose of Pius' Soul Celebrated in Rome

ROME, Aug. 29.—(Via Paris.)—The first of the three funeral masses to be held in the St. Peter's chapel for the repose of the soul of the late Pope Pius X. was celebrated this morning by Cardinals Vives and Vanutelli.

Final absolution was given by Cardinals Falconi, Agilardi, Casatta and De Lodi.

Around the catafalque, which is thirty-three feet high, surrounded by the triple crown and surrounded by hundreds of candles, sat nearly fifty cardinals.

Among these was Cardinal Fahey of New York, and on a stool at his feet sat his secretary, Rev. Thomas G. Carroll.

Behind the cardinals were the patriarch archbishops, monsignors and the whole Vatican court.

The United States was represented by Monsignor Patrick J. Hayes, chancellor of the archdiocese of New York; Monsignor John Edwards, vicar general of the archdiocese of New York; Monsignor Nevin F. Fisher of Philadelphia; and Monsignor Charles A. O'Hearn, vice rector of the American college in Rome.

The St. Peter's choir was conducted by its director, Monsignor Perot.
