Excavation for New Stadium at Cornell Started

ITHACA, N. Y., Aug. 29.-Dirt has begun to fly in the excavation work of the stadium which is to be erected on Cornell's alumni field as the result of a \$70,000 gift by the Schoellkopf family, and the field will be formally opened for varsity athletics next spring by the Cornell track team. It is also certain that the foot ball games of 1915 will be staged on the new field, which will accommodate about 9,000. All that will remain to complete the transfer of athletic activities from Percy field in the valley to Alumni field on the campus will be the erection of a studium for the base ball field and the laying out of the grounds. The running track will be a quarter mile

affair, with a straightaway on both sides, insuring not only a fine runway for the 200-yard and the 100-yard dash, but also an excellent starting and finishing course for the 440 and 580-yard dashes. The track follows the lines of that in the Harvard

One of the developments to follow the construction of the track will be the application by Cornell for the privilege of holding the intercollegiate track and field games in Ithaca at intervals with other college fields.

The Schoellkopf club house is about completed. The east side will be given over to the track and cross-country teams and the west side will be used by the foot ball team. The base ball team has a building of its own on a field to the west and on a lower level. The third floor will be fitted out with locker rooms for the use of minor sports teams and the overflow of the 'varsity teams.
