CARDINAL DELLA CHIESA CHOSEN POPE BY COLLEGE

New Pontiff, Who Was Elected on an Early Ballot, is Less Than Sixty Years Old.

ONE OF NEWEST CARDINALS

He Was Given His Red Hat by Late Pius X Only About Three Months Ago.

ARCHBISHOP OF BOLOGNA

New Pontiff is One of the Leading Opponents of the So-Called Modernism.

PROMINENT IN INNER CIRCLE

He Was Secretary to Cardinal Rampolla and Adviser to Holy Office.

TAKES NAME OF BENEDICT XV

Cardinals Gibbons and O'Connell Do Not Arrive in Time to Participate in the Election of New Pontiff.

ROME, Sept. 3 .- Cardinal Giacomo Della Chiesa, archbishop of hierarchy in succession to the late pope, Plus X, who died August 20. He will reign under the name of

The conclave of the sacred college, whose duty it is to elect the pope, Monday, August 31. The announcement of the outcome of its deliberations was made this morning shortly after 11 o'clock.

Cardinal Gibbons Delayed. Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore and Cardinal O'Connell of Boston are on board the steamer Canopic, which is not due at Naples until tomorrow. Consequently

neither of them participated in the election of the new pope. Cardinal Farley of New York reached here several days ago. Prince Chigi Albani, one of the assistants to the throne in the pope's household, was notified at 11:15 that Cardinal Della Chiesa had been elected.

At 11:20 Monsignor Misciatelli, subprefect of the sacred palaces and governor of the conclave, received a com munication from the new pope asking that the gratings of the Basilica of St. Peter's be opened, because he purposed in a short time to issue a proclamation.

At the same hour (11:30) the master of ceremonies appeared on the central baicony of St. Peter's and spread out the red carpet. The crowd below, which had been waiting for hours in the square in the expectation of an announcement as to the outcome of the deliberations of the sacred college, understood that a selection had been reached. The people applauded vigorously.

At twenty-five minutes before 12 Cardinal Della Volpe appeared on the balcony, with Monsignor Apostosti, bearing the pope's cross on his right, and pronounced the ritual announcing the election of Cardinal Della Chiesa. To this he added that the new pope had chosen the name of

Again the crowd of several thousand persons cheered and at once began to make their way into the Basilica to hear the Chinese port north of Tsing Tau, canthe benediction of the new pontiff. caped the censors tend to confirm La Fere Taken by the Germans After earlier official claims and admissions. The Germans are pushing their right wing nearer Paris, while their center and left appear to be held by the French. Russia DEFENDERS FORCED TO RETIRE is pressing forward in the Austrian province of Galicia, after Great Battle Which is to Decide having taken the strongly fortified capital, Lemberg. The Germans are admittedly victorious in east Prussia.

> The Japanese are said to have occupied seven islands near Kiao Chow and to have landed additional troops within marching distance of that German stronghold in the face of protests by China.

> King Nicholas of Montenegro s reported as determined to occupy Scutari.

The governor and other German officials of Samoa have been made prisoners by the British and sent to the Fiji islands.

WILHELM'S HOST CAPTURES AMIENS AFTER A BATTLE

Germans Take Possession of Capital of Department of Somme at End of Three Days' Fight.

SEVENTY MILES NORTH OF PARIS

Success of Tentons at Moreul Makes the Fall of This Place Certain.

ENTRY OF ENEMY UNCONTESTED

Mayor Announces Surrender and Urges Citizens to Refrain from Any Disturbance.

PARTY OF UHLANS SEIZE TOWN

French Retire to Picquigny, Blowing Up Bridges Over River.

COLORS OF KAISER ARE RAISED

Sing "Die Wacht am Rhein" and "Doutschland Uber Alles" as They March Into Place. LONDON, Sept. 3 .- A dispatch

from Amiens, France, to the Daily Mail, dated Tuesday, September 1, declares that the Germans have taken possession of Amiens after three days' fighting.

Amiens is the capital of the Department of Somme. It is seventy miles directly north of Paris. It is a manufacturing city and has a population of 90,000. It is on the line of the railroad to Boulogne and about fifty miles to the west of La. Fere and other points in the Department of Aisne, where there has been fighting during the last few days between the allied armies and the Ger-

Entry Not Contested. The dispatch to the Daily Mail from Amiens adds that the success of the Germans at Moreuil made the capture of Amiens certain. The entry was not contested. The mayor, after receiving a German envoy, announced the surrender of the city and urged the citizens to make no dis-

turbance.

"It was 7 o'clock Sunday evening," says the Mail correspondents "when a party of uhlans entered Amiens by the Rue Jules Barny. After a brief reconnoissance they retired to the German main body at Camon. A half hour later they returned. accompanied by an envoy, bearing a white flag.

Announces Surrender. "The latter interviewed Mayor Figuet at the town hall. After an hour's discussion the mayor appeared in front of the town hall with trumpeters and officially announced the surrender of the city. He urged that the citizens make no disturb-

"Later the mayor and the municipal counselors drove in carriages to pay a formal visit to the German commander, who told them that they would be held personally responsible with their lives for the good conduct of the citizens. "The Germans thereupon went to the

town hall, where they hauled down the French flag and holsted the German colors. The German troops began entering the city about midday Monday, singing as they came 'Die Wacht Am Rhein' and 'Deuachland Uber Alles.' "No time was wasted, however, as or-
