Alleged Burglar Arrested.

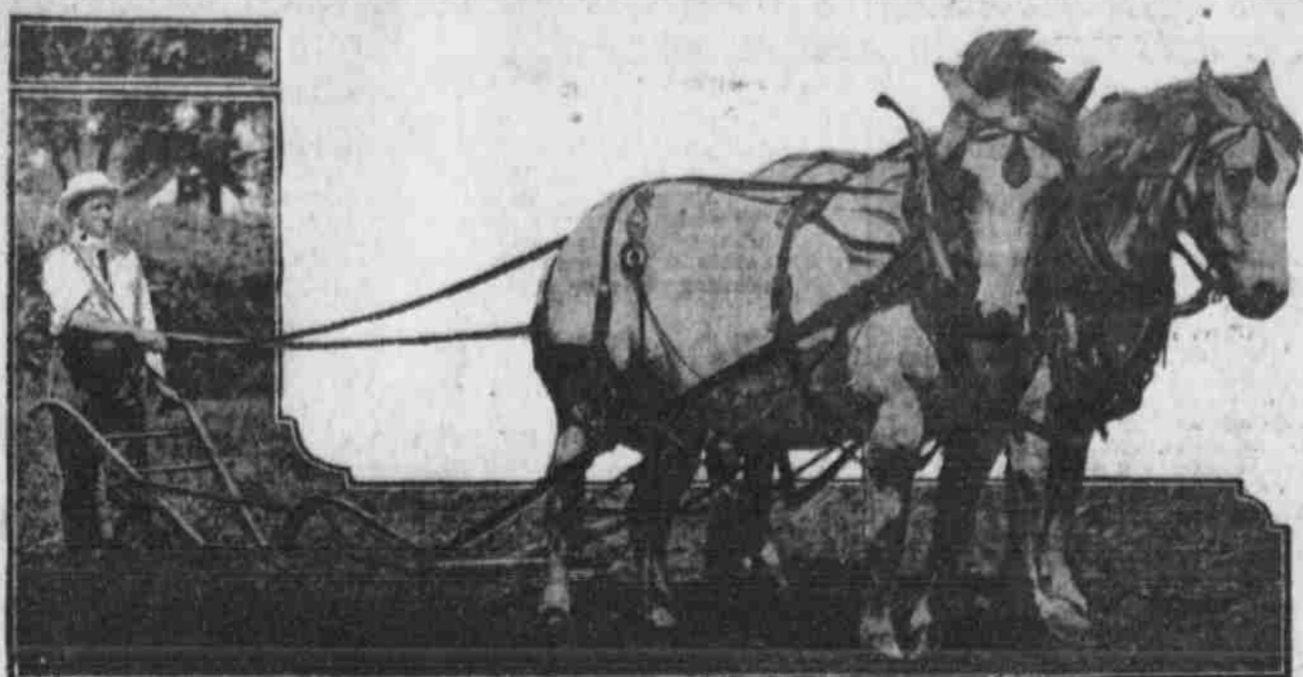

The Nebraska Food, Drug, Dairy and Oil commission will have at the State Fair grounds in Lincoln a Food and Dairy show, which will be an additional feature of the State Fair this year.

Two wings of the building will be devoted to the Dairy show, which will be under the auspices of the Nebraska Dairy and Creamery Improvement association. Their exhibit will be the big feature of the show and will consist of a model barn, a model dairy house and a large cream refrigerator of 1,500 cubic feet capacity, which has been built especially for this show, and in which will be placed a large butter exhibit.
