When Wednesday morn dawns bright and clear you'll find an army hundreds strong. They're brave, they're true and they are dear and they'll assail the business throng.

Wednesday will be tag day for the benefit of the Visiting Nurse association. Society women and everyone interested in this noble work will give up the entire day to lending all assistance possible to help net a large fund for the work for the coming winter when provisions and coal will have to be forthcoming for the sick poor of the city.

The women in charge and their large corps of assistants take command of the city at 8 o'clock the morning, when Mayor Dahman will hand over the official key for the day. There will be skirmishing parties sent to all parts of the city and South Omaha, and sentries will be placed at the entrance of all of the large buildings so that no one will escape without a tag, which will serve as a passport.

Five cents will be as welcome as \$100,000, one of them said to me, "and I do hope the men will not wait for the young women to ask them to buy tags."

Mrs. Baker Writes from London. A letter dated at London, August 17, from Mrs. Benjamin S. Baker to her sister, Miss Reynolds, says: "War was declared the day following our arrival in London. Banks closed for three days, but we were fortunate in having some money with us and in getting comfortable quarters and have gotten along splendidly."

"Upon declaration of war Americans came to London in droves from the continent and many had a very hard time, it being almost impossible to get money or accommodations. Everybody was frantic to get home and all wanted to go at once. We have met many Omaha people. The Masons have established headquarters here and have been and are doing a grand relief work among the Americans.

"Of course we are terribly disappointed at not being able to make our trip as planned, but thankful we got no further than London, as most who did lost all their trunks and clothing.

"We have taken in about everything in London from the slums to royalty and have enjoyed the beautiful climate here very much. The judge is greatly taken with Great Britain and the English people, but America is good enough for me. We have booked on the Baltic (White Star line) for September 10. Should like to leave for home earlier, but this is the best we can do.

Colonel and Mrs. Benton of Boston leave with us tomorrow for a tour of Scotland and Ireland. In the interim, don't worry about us, for we are all right and having a good time."
