HOSTILE ACTS MUST BE AVOIDED Food and Forage for Men and Commanders Guarantee Security to

Inhabitants if Terms Are Horses Demanded, but Will Be Paid for in Coin or After Termination of War.

(Correspondence of The Associated Press.) BERLIN, Aug. 26.-The commanders of the German troops are issuing a procla-

mation to the inhabitants of every hostile town they occupy, as follows: Citizens—A body of the German army inder my command has occupied your ity. Inasmuch as the war is carried on only between the armics, I guarantee in due form the lite and private property of all the inhabitants, unger the following, conditions.

onditions:
1. The inhabitants must strictly avoid very hostile act against the German

1. Food and forage for our men and horses are to be furnished by the inhabitants. Every such delivery will be paid for at once in coin or a receipt will be lasted to be redeemed after the termination of the war.

3. The inhabitants are to house our sol-

3. The inhabitants are to house our soldiers and horses in the best manner and to keep their houses lighted at night.
4. The inhabitants are to put the roads in a passable condition, to remove all obstacles erected by the enemy, and to give the best support to our troops in order that they may be able to fulfill their task, doubly difficult in a hostile land. 6. It is forbidden to collect in crowds on the streets, to ring the bells or to com-municate with the enemy in any way

municate with the enemy in any way whatever.

6. All weapons in possession of the inhabitants are to be handed over at the town hall within two hours.

7. The mayor, the clergymen and four well reputed citizens are to appear before me at once to act as hostages during the stay of the troops. Under these conditions—I repeat it—the lives and private property of the inhabitants are perfectly secure. The strict discipline to which our soldiers are accustomed renders it possible that no inhabitant will be compelled to neglect his business affairs, or to desert his housiness affairs, or to desert his home and hearth. On the other hand. I shall adopt the most stringent measures as soon as the above conditions are not observed. In this respect I shall hold the hostages in the first instance responsible. INCOME TAX MINIMUM CUT

After July it Will Be \$2,000 According to Committee Plan.

MALT LIQUORS TAX RAISED

Distilled Liquors Escape in Pro posal of Congresamen Who Are Devising Method of Raising More Cash.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 .- An income tax ncrease of one-half of 1 per cent and a reduction of the minimum exemption from \$3,000 to \$2,000 and the maximum exemption from \$4,000 to \$3,000 were tentatively agreed upon today by democratic members of the ways and means committee, who are framing the emergency revenue bill to raise \$100,000,600. It is estimated that the proposed income tax-

changes would produce \$35,000,000 annually. In deciding on the income tax increases, he committee considered the fact that revenue from this source would not be available until next July, but the opinior was general that the increased revenue from other sources would meet and deficit until that time. Under the proposed hanges the income tax would be 11/2 per dent on incomes of single persons in excess of \$2,000,000 and the same on married persons in excess of \$3,000. In addition the one-half per cent increase would be added pro rata in accordance with the increased sur taxes on incomes in ex-

The committee agreed also that the increased tax on beer and malt liquors should be 50 cents a barrel, bringing in \$35,000,000. On domestic wines an extra tax of 20 cents a gallon will raise \$10,000,000.

As a consequence of nonobservance of products, automobiles, gasoline, umusement tickets, magazines and many other articles, and commodities which had been proposed, the increased income tax averting the necessity of levying against these articles.

No official announcement of the committee action was made, Representative Underwood, the chairman, stating that the program was subject to change. The mittee will meet again Thursday.

Requesting Judgment Be Suspruded Till Causes Leading to War Probed.

tary Bryan. The statement follows:

The undersigned American citizens, 'passe agers on the sceamship Potterdan, all of whom were in Germany during the present hostilities, ask the Associated Press through its var5us channels to give publicity to the following statement:

That the reports regarding ill treatment of Americans by Lermany, emenating from English and French sources, are absolutely false.

Travel through Germany, as far as the extraordinary circumstances permitted, was altogether safe as officials and eliclasses of the people were, without exception, very friendly and helpful.

No well authenticated atrocties were perpetrated by the German troops.

All of the German official bulletins regarding the progress of the war were in every case subsequently confirmed, and thus the reports coming from English, French and Helgian sources disproved. In our judgment the distorted reports which have reached America were sent cut with the deliberate purpose of deciving Americans and thus creating a sentiment in favor of the powers now arrayed against Germany.

We ask all Americans to suspend judgment until they have an opportunity to make an impartial investigation of the causes which have led to the present conflict and especially to study the diplonate correspondence. It is our conviction that Germany has not been the aggressor, but that the war has been forced upon it by the envy and greed of those nations that are jealous of its srowing industrial and commaccal independence and for this reason are ready

COMMISSION FINDS **GERMAN ATROCITIES**

Report of Belgian Investigation Blames Kaiser's Men for Looting and Pillaging.

Men, Women and Children Com pelled to March Before German Troops with White Fings to Deceive French.

LONDON, Sept '8-A news agency dispatch from Antwerp received here today says that the report of the commission appointed by the Beigian government to investigate the charges of German atrocities, finds that atrocities were committed the Germans at Louvain, Vice, Aerechot, Onsmael and in the district of Malines.

Inoffensive pedestrians, cyclists and peasants, the report says, were shot by the Germans, who also robbed the public treasuries and burned and pillaged houses and towns on the pretext that the inhabitants fired at the German troops.

The commission found that Belgians were deported to Germany to aid in gathering the harvest and that in some cases the Belgians were compelled to fight against the Russians. It is also declared that men were shut up in churches while the women were outraged.

Men, women and children, the report concludes, were compelled to march in front of the German troops, showing the troops to approach.
