Sheriff Offers to Accept \$40 Per Day Less for Jail Food

Sheriff F. J. McShane, Jr., made an offer to the board of county commissioners to feed prisoners in the county jail for 20 cents per day each, a saving to the county of 20 cents per day for each prisoner or a total of \$6 per day over the former 40 cents a day charge. This offer is the direct result of the supreme court's decision in the case which was three times fought to the tribunal of last resort by the county board under direction of County Commissioner John C. Lynch, chairman of the court house committee. The county commissioners insisted that McShane should accept 27 1/2 cents per day, the price which he formerly offered to take before conceiving the idea that he should receive 27 cents. The 27-cent rate would mean a saving to the county of 14 per day. The dispute was left unsettled.
